### Powering On/Off the Projector


#### Powering On the Projector

- 1. Open the lens door. **①**
- Ensure that the power cord and signal cable are securely connected. 2 The Power LED will be Amber.
- 3. Turn on the lamp by pressing "Power/Standby" button either on the top of the projector or pressing "Power" button on the remote. The Power LED will flash green.

The startup screen will display in approximately 10 seconds. The first time you use the projector, you can select your preferred language from quick menu after the startup screen display.

- 4. Turn on your source (computer, notebook, video player, etc.). The projector will detect your source automatically.
- If the screen displays "No Signal", please make sure the signal cables are securely connected.
- If you connect multiple sources at the same time, press the "Source" button on the control panel or direct source key on the remote control to switch between inputs.

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### Powering Off the Projector

1. Press the "Power/Standby" button to turn off the projector lamp, you will see a message displayed on the projector's screen.





- Press the "Power/Standby" button again to confirm, otherwise the message will disappear after 15 seconds.
   When you press "Power/Standby" button second, the system will show the timing countdown on the screen.
- 3. The cooling fans continue to operate for about 10 seconds for cooling cycle. When the Power LED turn Amber, the projector has entered standby mode.
- If you wish to turn the projector back on, you must wait until the projector has completed the cooling cycle and has entered standby mode. Once in standby mode, simply press "Power/ Standby" button to restart the projector.
- 4. Disconnect the power cord from the electrical outlet and the projector.
- 5. Do not turn on the projector immediately following a power off procedure.


The projector is equipped with elevator foot for adjusting the image height.

To raise the image:

- 3. Use screw in foot **3** to fine-tune the display angle.






### Adjusting the Projector's Zoom / Focus

#### Remote Control Problems





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
