




Powering On/Off the Projector

Powering On the Projector

- 1. Remove the lens cap. **①**
- 2. Securely connect the power cord and signal cable. When connected, the power led will turn red.
- 3. Turn on the lamp by pressing "O" button on the control panel. The power led will now flash blue. The startup screen will display in approximately 30 seconds. The first time you use the projector, you can select your preferred language from quick menu after the startup screen display.
- 4. Turn on your source that you want to display on the screen (computer, notebook, video player, etc). The projector will detect the source automatically and will display on the screen. If not, push menu button and go to "Options". Make sure that the "Source Lock" has been set to "Off".
- If you connected multiple sources at the same time, press the "Source" button on the control panel or direct source key on the remote control to switch between inputs.



Powering Off the Projector

1. Press the " \mathfrak{G} " button to turn off the projector. The following message will be displayed on the screen.



Press the "O" button again to confirm the shut down. If the button is not pressed, the message will disappear in 5 seconds.

- The cooling fans continue to operate for about 60 seconds for cooling cycle and the Power LED will flash blue. When the lights solid red, the projector has entered standby mode.
 If you wish to turn the projector back on, you must wait until the projector has completed the cooling cycle and has

Adjusting the Projected Image

Adjusting the Projector's Height


The projector is equipped with elevator feet for adjusting the image height.

To raise the image:

- 1. Press the elevator button **①**.
- 2. Raise the image to the desired height angle ②, then release the button to lock the elevator feet into position.
- 3. Use screw in feet **3** to fine-tune the display angle.


To lower the image:

- 1. Press the elevator button.
- 2. Lower the image, then release the button to lock the elevator feet into position.
- 3. Use screw in feet **3** to fine-tune the display angle.




Adjusting the Projector's Zoom/Focus

Turn the Zoom Lever to zoom in or zoom out. To focus the image, turn the focus ring until you see a clear image. The projector will focus at distances from 4.9 to 41.0 feet (1.5 to 12.5 meters) and the projection screen size from 0.68m~7.75m (26.77"~305.22") at 16:9 mode with mechanical travel.
