

Prevent condensation

1.2.2.1 Heat and Fire Hazards

Warning Risk of Fire

BARCO large screen projection products are designed and manufactured to meet the most stringent safety regulations. This projector radiates heat on its external surfaces and from ventilation ducts during normal operation, which is both normal and safe.

Exposing flammable or combustible materials into close proximity of this projector could result in the spontaneous ignition of that material, resulting in a fire. For this reason, it is absolutely necessary to leave an "exclusion zone" around all external surfaces of the projector whereby no flammable or combustible materials are present. The exclusion zone must be not less than 40 cm (16") for all projectors. The exclusion zone on the lens side must be at least 2m. Do not cover the projector or the lens with any material while the projector is in operation. Keep flammable and combustible materials away from the projector at all times. Mount the projector in a well ventilated area away from sources of ignition and out of direct sun light. Never expose the projector to rain or moisture. In the event of fire, use sand, CO₂, or dry powder fire extinguishers; never use water on an electrical fire. Always have service performed on this projector by authorized BARCO service personnel. Always insist on genuine BARCO replacement parts. Never use non-BARCO replacement parts as they may degrade the safety of this projector.

Slots and Openings

Slots and openings in the cabinet and the sides are provided for ventilation; to ensure reliable operation of the projector and to protect it from overheating, these openings must not be blocked or covered. The openings should never be blocked by placing the product too close to walls, or other similar surface. This product should never be placed near or over a radiator or heat register. This projector should not be placed in a built-in installation or enclosure unless proper ventilation is provided.

Projection Room

Projection rooms must be well ventilated or cooled in order to avoid build up of heat around the projector.

In order to ensure that correct airflow is maintained, and that the projector complies with Electromagnetic Compatibility requirements, it should always be operated with all of it's covers in place.

Ensure that nothing can be spilled on, or dropped inside the projector. If this does happen, switch off and unplug the mains supply immediately. Do not operate the projector again until it has been checked by qualified service personnel.

The projector must always be mounted in a manner which ensures free flow of air into its air inlets and unimpeded evacuation of the hot air exhausted from its cooling system. Heat sensitive materials should not be placed in the path of the exhausted air.

1.2.2.3 Protection from High Intensity Light Beam and Ultraviolet Radiation




Image 2-1 Structure of the Cine VERSUM Concept







Top side dimensions in mm




Image 4-3 Bottom side dimensions in mm





Image 4-4 Air In-/Outlet Cine VERSUM Master





Image 4-6 Bottom side dimensions in mm





Image 4-8 Outside dimensions Cine VERSUM 120





Image 4-10 Front side dimensions in mm




Image 4-12 Air In-/Outlet Cine VERSUM 50

Rear and Front view

The only hardware control on the Cine VERSUM 50 is the Main Power Switch (1), located at the backside of the screen itself. This switch puts the Screen in the OFF, Standby or Operation mode fixed by the previous status. From the Standby position or the operation mode, the Cine VERSUM 50 is controlled by the Cine VERSUM Master.

The status of the Plasma screen is indicated by a blue LED (3), located at the bottom on the right of the screen. In the same corner an IR Sensor (2) is mounted to allow controlling the Cine VERSUM system via the screen.




Image 5-2 Cine VERSUM 50 controls





6.1 Projector Installation Guidelines

6.1.1 General Installation Guidelines



Before installing the projector, read first the safety instructions.

Temperature and humidity conditions

- The installation site should meet the following conditions:
 - Operating temperature: 10 to 35 °C (largely depending on installation conditions)
 - Operating humidity: 0 to 98% RH Non-condensing
 - Storage temperature: -35 to +65°C
 - Storage humidity: 0 to 98% RH Non-condensing
 - Operating atmospheric pressure: 700 to 1100kPa
 - Storage atmospheric pressure: 600 to 1500 hPa
- We recommend against installing electronic products such as this unit in locations subject to high humidity. If the unit is to be installed in a location subject to relatively high humidity, observe the following:
 - Failure to install the unit in unacceptable ways may result in non-warranty damages.
 - Make sure the unit is grounded.
 - Do not allow water or other liquid to enter the unit.

Environment

Do not install the projection system in a site near heat sources such as radiators or hot air ducts, or in a place subject to direct sunlight, excessive dust or humidity. Be aware that room heat rises to the ceiling, prevent that the temperature near the installation site becomes too excessive.

Environment condition check

A projector must always be mounted in a manner which ensures the free flow of clean air into the projectors ventilation inlets. For installations in environments where the projector is subject to airborne contaminants such as cigarette smoke or similar (these deposit a layer of greasy residue upon the projectors internal optics and imaging electronic surfaces, degrading performance), then it is highly advisable and desirable to have this contamination removed prior to it reaching the projectors clean air supply. Devices or structures to extract or shield contaminated air well away from the projector are a prerequisite, if this is not a feasible solution then measures to relocate the projector to a clean air environment should be considered.

Only ever use the manufactures recommended cleaning kit which has been specifically designed for cleaning optical parts, never use industrial strength cleaners on a projectors optics as these will degrade optical coatings and damage sensitive optoelectronics components. Failure to take suitable precautions to protect the projector from the effects of persistent and prolonged air contaminants will culminate in extensive and irreversible ingrained optical damage. At this stage cleaning of the internal optical units will be non-effective and impracticable. Damage of this nature is under no circumstances covered under the manufactures warranty and may deem the warranty null and void. In such a case the client shall be held solely responsible for all costs incurred during any repair. It is the clients responsibility to ensure at all times that the projector is protected from the harmful effects of hostile airborne particles in the environment of the projector. The manufacture reserves the right to refuse repair if a projector has been subject to wilful neglect, abandon or improper use.

Which screen type?

There are two major categories of screens used for projection equipment. Those used for front projected images and those for rear projection applications.

Screens are rated by how much light they reflect (or transmit in the case of rear projection systems) given a determined amount of light projected toward them. The 'GAIN' of a screen is the term used. Front and rear screens are both rated in terms of gain. The gain of screens range from a white matte screen with a gain of 1 (x1) to a brushed aluminized screen with a gain of 10 (x10) or more. The choice between higher and lower gain screens is largely a matter of personal preference and another consideration called the Viewing angle. In considering the type of screen to choose, determine where the viewers will be located and go for the highest gain screen possible. A high gain screen will provide a brighter picture but reduce the viewing angle. For more information about screens, contact your local screen supplier.

What image size? How big should the image be?

The Cine VERSUM 80 is equipped with a Zoom Lens (1.80-2.44:1) designed for projecting images with screen size width of : min 0.60 m (2.36 ft) to max (6.10 m 24.02 ft) (depending on the ambient light conditions), with a default aspect ratio 16 : 9, electronic 4 \cdot 3

The Cine VERSUM 120 can be combined with a wide versatility of lenses (optional) to project out-of-axis both horizontally and vertically, which make the projector ideal for installation in the architecturally most demanding environment.

6.1.2.1 Cleaning the lens



To minimize the possibility of damaging the optical coating or scratching exposed lens surface, we have developed recommendations for cleaning the lens. FIRST, we recommend you try to remove any material from the lens by blowing it off with clean, dry deionized air. DO NOT use any liquid to clean the lenses.

Necessary tools

Toraysee™ cloth (delivered together with the lens kit). Order number : R379058.

How to clean the lens?

Proceed as follow:

- 1. Always wipe lenses with a CLEAN Toraysee™ cloth.
- 2. Always wipe lenses in a single direction.

Warning: Do not wipe back and forwards across the lens surface as this tends to grind dirt into the coating.

- 3. Do not leave cleaning cloth in either an open room or lab coat pocket, as doing so can contaminate the cloth.
- 4. If smears occur when cleaning lenses, replace the cloth. Smears are the first indication of a dirty cloth.



Do not use fabric softener when washing the cleaning cloth or softener sheets when drying the cloth.

Do not use liquid cleaners on the cloth as doing so will contaminate the cloth.









Image 6-2 Rear: Mirror projection

6.1.2.3 Projector distance adjustment

Cine VERSUM 80: Calculation of the projector distance PD

Place the projector at the required distance from the screen according to the desired screen size. The required distance can be calculated with the formula added to the drawing below.



The formula is based upon projecting an 16:9 image so that it occupies the entire 16:9 screen.

The projector distance PD is measured from lens support (indicated with fingertip in drawing) to screen face.



Zoom Range WIDE: from 0.8 to 6.0 m
 Zoom Range TELE: from 0.6 to 4.5 m

Cine VERSUM 120: Calculation of the projector distance PD




Image 6-5 Calculation of the projector distance (PD)

6.1.2.4 Projector installation requirements

Cine VERSUM 80: Installation requirements

- Position the projector perpendicular to the screen and leveled to achieve an optimal image. An inclination of the projector is allowed but limited to 10° in one direction (. The latter generates image distortion (keystoned) which can be corrected using the projector's menu system.
- The projector lens should be centered horizontally in the middle of the screen (Vertical shift of the lens built-in).
- Position the screen so that it is not in direct sunlight or room light. Light falling directly onto the screen washes out the colors, making viewing difficult. Close the curtains and dim the lights when setting up the screen in a sunny or bright room.
- · A polarizing screen cannot be used with this projector.



The maximum mounting inclination angle for the projector is 10°.




Image 6-6 Projector inclination angle

Cine VERSUM 120: Installation requirements

- Position the projector perpendicular to the screen and leveled to achieve an optimal image. An inclination of the projector is allowed but limited due to the maximum keystone correction range.
- A swing of the projector is limited to 10° in both directions (due to the lamp position in the projector).
- The projector lens should be centered horizontally in the middle of the screen (Vertical and Horizontal shift of the lens built-in).
- Position the screen so that it is not in direct sunlight or room light. Light falling directly onto the screen washes out the colors, making viewing difficult. Close the curtains and dim the lights when setting up the screen in a sunny or bright room.
- A polarizing screen cannot be used with this projector.



The maximum mounting swing angle for the projector is 10°.




Image 6-7 Projector swing angle

THECine VERSUM 80: Using the provided Lens vertical Shift controls AND ACCESSORIES

The picture can be adjusted vertically within the shift range of the lens by rotation the lens shift screw on top of the projector (below top cover) using a flat screwdriver or by hand to match the setup configuration.

The vertical lens shift range is +100% and -100% with respect to the optical axis of the projection lens (Tilting the projector will reduce the effectiveness of the lens shift function).

When the height of the projected image is adjusted, the image may become distorted (keystoned), depending on the relative positions of the projector and the screen. How to adjust the keystone correction, see "Keystone Correction", page 110.




Image 6-8 Lens shift

- 2 Lens shift fixed projector






Image 6-10 Ceiling mount for Cine VERSUM 80




Image 6-11 Ceiling mount for Cine VERSUM 120




Image 6-12 Extension supports for ceiling mount assembly

6.2.1 About Installation of the Unit



To avoid malfunction, overheating of this unit, and possible fire hazard, make sure that the vents on the main unit are not blocked when installing. Also hot air is expelled from the air vents, be careful of deterioration and dirt build up on rear surface wall, etc..



Please be sure to use an M8 (Pitch=1.25mm) bolt. (Only this size bolt can be used.)



Because this unit weights about 40 kg and the lack of depth makes it fairly unstable, please use 2 people or more when packing, carrying or installing.



This unit incorporates a thin design. To ensure safety if vibrated or shaken, please be sure to take measures to prevent the unit from tipping over.


Way of installing the unit

Two kits are designed by BARCO for the installation of the unit, a Wall and a Table mount kit.

6.2.2 Installation using the Wall mount kit

How to install the Wall mount kit

- 1. Be sure to attach in 4 or more locations above and below, left and right of the center line.
- 2. Use bolts that are long enough to be inserted 12 mm to 18 mm into the main unit from the attaching surfaces for both 'a' holes and 'b' holes. Refer to the side view diagram below.
- 3. As this unit is constructed with glass, be sure to install it on a flat, not warped surface. (image 6-13, image 6-14, image 6-15)






Image 6-14 Wall mount assembly





Image 6-15 Dimensions wall mount assembly






Image 7-9 Power connection




Image 7-11 Monitor connection




Image 7-14 Digital link with Cine VERSUM 50






Image 7-19 Digital linking long distance via wall outlet

8.1 Battery Insertion in the Remote Control



- Insert batteries so that the plus (+) and minus (-) sides are aligned according to the markings in the battery case.
- Do not mix new batteries with used ones.
- The voltage of batteries may differ even if they are the same shape. Please do not mix different kinds of
- When not using the remote control unit for a long period of time (1 month of more), remove the batteries from the remote control unit to prevent leaking of battery fluid. If battery liquid has leaked, thoroughly wipe the inside of the case until all liquid is removed, an then insert new batteries.
- Do not charge, short, disassemble or throw the provided batteries in a fire.



When disposing of used batteries, please comply with governmental regulations or environmental public instruction's rules that apply in your country.

Where to find the batteries

The batteries are not placed in the remote control to avoid remote control operation in its package, resulting in a shorter battery life time.

The batteries are packed separately and added to the package of the remote control.

How to install the batteries

- 1. Push the cover tab (A) with the fingernail a little backwards and pull upwards the cover top (B). (image 8-1)
- 2. Slide the cover forwards to remove. (image 8-2)
- 3. Push the battery body towards the spring and lift it up to remove. (image 8-3)
- 4. Insert two AA size batteries, making sure the polarities match the + and marks inside the battery compartment (image 8-3).
- 5. Insert the lower tab of the battery cover in the gap at the bottom of the remote control, and press the cover until it clicks in place (image 8-3).


8.2 Operating the Remote Control

Remote Control operation

This remote control includes a battery powered infrared transmitter which allows the user to control the Cine VERSUM Master remotely via its own built-in infrared receiver or via the infrared receivers built-in in the linked displays.



If backlight and RC operation indicator lights up too long or continuously, batteries need to be replaced.



When operating the remote control unit, point it at the remote sensor, located on the front side of the modules. The remote control unit is operable up to 9 m from the unit and within a 45 angle on each side of the sensor.

The signal from the remote control can be reflected off a screen for easy operation. However, the effective distance of the signal may differ due to the screen material.

When a key on the remote control is pressed, backlight is activated automatically. That allows the user to operate the remote control in a dark room. Backlight is turned off automatically a few seconds after the last key activation.

Remote control operation's difficulties


- · The remote control unit may not operate if there are objects placed between it and the display.
- Operational distances will gradually become shorter as the batteries begin to wear out, replace weak batteries with new ones as soon as possible.
- Depending on the installation surroundings, this unit's remote control may be influenced by the infrared rays discharged from the plasma display, hampering reception of its rays or limiting its operational distance. The strength of infrared rays discharged from the screen will differ according to the picture displayed.

8.3 Address setting for the Remote Control

How to set the Remote Control address

- Point the Remote Control to the module you desire to know the address and press the address key (recessed key).
 On-screen and in the graphical display appears the number of the address. Now proceed to program the address in the Remote Control
- 2. Again, press the ADDRESS key on the Remote Control. (image 8-5)
- 3. Press the digit key, corresponding with the desired address (between 0 and 9), WITHIN 5 SECONDS after the key has been pressed. (image 8-6)

The commands from the Remote Control are sent with the stored address.

9. POINTS OF SIMILARITY BETWEEN GRAPHICAL DISPLAY AND ON SCREEN MENUS

9.1 Explanation about differences in menu displays

Purpose

The different adjustment items are structured in main and sub menus. The way of showing the menus is different between the Cine VERSUM Master and the linked displays, but the subject matter of the menus is similar. Below a summary of the most important differences:

Graphical display on Cine VERSUM Master

On the Cine VERSUM Master a 4-line graphical display is built-in, with the result that only 4 items of a menu can be displayed. Rotating the selection wheel allows to scroll through the items, whereas pressing it, confirms the selection.



Powering on/off

Powering on/off is understood to mean switching on (to standby mode) and OFF the modules by means of its own power switch.

11.1 Powering ON the Cine VERSUM System

How to switch ON

An order of powering up the modules is not important.

- 1. Press the Power switch on the Cine VERSUM Master (On Cine VERSUM Master, page 27).
- 2. Turn over the power switch of the Cine VERSUM 50 (if in the link) in the (I) position (ON state) (Cine VERSUM 50, page 12).
- 3. Press the Power switch on the Cine VERSUM 80 (if in the link) (Cine VERSUM 80, page 13).
- 4. Press the Power switch on the Cine VERSUM 120 (if in the link) (Cine VERSUM 120, page 29)

11.2 Status of the System after powering up

About status of the modules after powering up

The last status of the modules is determinative for the status after the respective power switches have been turned on.

The System, from operation mode, can be powered down, using the respective power switches (Case A) or the power down mode (Case B). The power down mode switches the system in the standby mode. Also important is the status of the respective displays in the link (On or Off).

When turning on the power switch of the respective modules, the modules return to the last status.

Status of the modules in the system (Case A)

Status modules	Cine VERSUM Master, Cine VERSUM 50, Cine VERSUM 80 and Cine VERSUM 120 in the operation mode.



The linked displays return to the operation mode also, if they have the individual status 'ON' (Switching linked displays To and Out Standby, page 89).





12.2 Image Projection Using the Remote Control

Way of starting image projection

Different keys on the remote control can be used for starting image projection. Make sure that the Remote control suits the address of the Cine VERSUM Master or uses the common address.

- (A) Standby key: last selected source re-selected.
- (B) Source selection key: direct access to the desired source.
- (C) ADJ (Adjust) and ENTER key: last selected source re-selected.

How starting the image projection(Case A & B)

1. Press the standby key or a valid source selection key (On InfraRed Remote Control, page 30). The Cine VERSUM Master starts up, indicated by the message 'Power up' in the display (menu 12-2).

The Cine VERSUM Master starts operation mode and starts on its turn image projection on the active linked displays. In case of pressing the standby key, the displayed image is the selected video source when powering down the system before. The file of the selected source is added to the menu (left-bottom)(menu 12-3).

How starting the image projection (Case C)

- 1. Press the ADJ or ENTER key (On InfraRed Remote Control, page 30). Menu on graphical display changes as follows –menu 12-1.
- 2. Press the cursor keys ↑ or ↓ to select item 'Power Up' (arrow in front of item).
- 3. Press ENTER to confirm. The Cine VERSUM Master starts up, indicated by the message 'Power up' in the display (menu 12-2).

About Lamp Mode for Cine VERSUM 120

The Cine VERSUM 120 is equipped with a dual lamp unit. This lamp unit can be programmed to work in a single or a dual lamp mode as well as boosted in power from 200 W (Economic) to 250 W (Normal).

When a lamp fails in the dual lamp mode, the projector goes on with projection on the remaining lamp.

When programming Single mode, then the least used lamp will be ignited.



Lamp 'mode' and 'power' can be set up in the IMAGE SETTINGS and in the DISPLAY SETTINGS menu. Both set ups overrule each other, except when forced lamp 1 or 2 has been chosen in the LAMP MODE menu.

12.3.1 Lamp Mode Set Up Single/Dual (Image Settings menu)



When forced lamp 1 or 2 has been set up, then, item *LAMP MODE* in the Image Settings menu is replaced by non-active 'Forced lamp 1 or 2' item.




Image 12-1 Menu item Lamp Mode







After the power down time, the standby LED on the Cine VERSUM 80 stays blinking on a beat of 0.3s on, 0.3s off for approximately 1 minute, named the cool down time. A new start up command will be executed after the cool down period only.




Image 15-1 Example of address set up

16.1 About Stored files

Cine VERSUM Master memory

The Master's memory contains a list of files corresponding to the most used sources. When the Master starts up (with active connected sources to the input modules), the input signals are scanned and compared with an already stored file. Mostly the result is a new custom file (linked to the input slot and e.g. differences in adjustments) for that input signal which is stored in the memory of the Master. If the automatic created file needs small corrections, the Edit file option allows to adjust the file.

If no stored file corresponds to the specs of the scanned input signal, a most corresponding file can be loaded for that input signal and then further edited to match the specs of the input signal.

How a file is coded

The stored file name includes 5 parts, e.g. bbbbbbbb.eee n ppppxppppi

16.2 Loading a File





How adjusting the parameters

- 1. For a parameter associated to a barscale, rotate the selection wheel on the Master or press the left/right arrow keys on the Remote Control to increment or decrement the value. (image 16-1)
- 2. For a parameter associated to a value change, on the Master, rotate the selection wheel to increment or decrement the digit and press the wheel to jump between digits and with the Remote Control, press the respective digit keys consecutively. (image 16-2)

16.4 File identification

How identifying the new selected source

When editing a custom file, NEVER adjust the automatically measured values as they are used to identify the input source file when selecting.

Explanation of the Edit file menu items

Menu Item	Explanation
Horizontal Total Pixels	If the value for 'Horizontal Total pixels' is wrong, sampling mistakes, small vertical bars will be seen in the image (Total numbers of pixels between 2 sync pulses is used to adjust the sampling rate).
	Select 'Total' and increase or decrease the pixel quantity for no bars in the image. (image 16-4)
Active pixels	The 'Active pixels' determine the width of the window on the screen. This value is normally given in the source specifications. If not, adjust until full image is displayed (no missing pixels). (image 16-4)
Horizontal start	This is the number of the pixels between the beginning of the input signal and the start of the video information in the signal. (image 16-4)
Horizontal Period	This is already filled in with the correct value at the time of the source identifying.
Vertical Total Lines	This is already filled in with the correct value at the time of the source identifying.
Active Lines	This is the number of horizontal lines determining the height of the projected image. This value is normally given in the specification of the source. If not, adjust until full image height is displayed (no missing lines).
Vertical Start	This is the number of the lines between the start of the input signal and the start of the image on the screen.
Interlaced [On] or [Off]	This selection is automatically filled at source identifying. If he image is wrong, due to wrong measurements, use the ENTER key to toggle between On and Off. (For interlaced images, 1 frame contains 2 fields).
Read AMDS	AMDS = Automatic Mode Detection & Synchronization
	Selecting AMDS and confirmed with ENTER , the system re-identify the input source.

Explanation of the Edit file menu option items

Option Item	Explanation
Source Number	The source number of a non-active source can be changed to any other source number. This makes it possible to create a file for future source numbers.
Clamp Position	Clamping determines the back level of the signal. The clamp pulse can be related to the leading or the trailing edge of the synchro pulse. Use the ENTER key to toggle between Leading and Trailing. (image 16-5)
Clamp Delay	The time between the leading edge of the clamp pulse and the locked edge of the synchro pulse. Can be any value between 0 and 255. Change the value by pushing the curser key ↑ or ↓. (image 16-5)
Clamp Width	The width of the clamp pulse can be any value between 0 and 255. Change the value by pushing the curser key ↑ or ↓. image 16-5)
Field Polarity	The field polarity function is used for interlaced images. Both rasters of the image could be shifted in a wrong way (double lines are visible in the image). This can be corrected by forcing the field polarity to Neg. or Pos. Use the ENTER key to toggle between Pos. and Neg.
Field Select	Default setting = [Both]
	The field select is only used for interlaced images. One frame of an interlaced image contains two fields, an even and an odd field. The choice exists to project [both] fields on the screen or only the [even] or [odd] field. This can be useful for 3D projection. Use the ENTER key to toggle between Both, Even and Odd.
Vertical Refresh	The way of updating the image information on the display panels. This item is not available for Pal-NTSC-Secam sources, and for that reason displayed in gray.
· Acres	- For sources with a vertical frequency up to 60 Hz: the vertical refresh rate is the same as the



For sources with a vertical frequency up to 60 Hz: the vertical refresh rate is the same as the vertical frequency of the source. This is a necessity to project moving images without 'motion artifacts'. For stationary images with a vertical frequency up to 60 Hz, it is still possible to use asynchronous refresh. When loading Pal, Secam or NTSC-files, the synchronous mode is default, for all other sources below 60 Hz, asynchronous mode is default.

- For sources with a vertical frequency higher than 60 Hz: the vertical refresh is different than the vertical frequency of the source. Synchronous refresh cannot be used.

Option Item	Explanation
Vertical Synchro Polarity	The vertical refresh can be synchronized with the leading or trailing sync edge. Default setting is [Leading]. Toggling to [Trailing] is only necessary for special applications where the trailing edge of the synchro signal has to be taken as a reference. Use the ENTER key to toggle between Leading and Trailing.
Film mode detection: [On] or [Off]	Detects in the [on] mode if the source is film or video. Use the ENTER key to toggle between [on] or [off]
	When enabled, the hardware looks for telltale signs of 3:2 or 2:2 pull-down sequences. These are the result of converting cinema material recorded at 24 frames-per-second to the television frequencies of 60 or 50 interlaced fields per second respectively. When FILM conversion is detected, the original 24 frames-per-second are restored. This avoids de-interlacing artefacts, and results in a perfect artefact-free display. Note that in some cases (video clips, scrolling news stickers,) FILM and VIDEO material are mixed on one screen. This may confuse the detector and cause it to go into FILM restoration mode. This will cause "jaggies" or motion artefacts. In such cases, disabling FILM mode processing is the best cure.
Banner Protect: [On] or [Off]	Only active when film mode detection is in the on position. Use the ENTER key to toggle between [on] or [off].
	FILM mode processing normally processes the entire display, but this may cause problems on sources where video and FILM content are mixed. One very common example is scrolling banners at the bottom of the screen (e.g. financial news). For those cases, the "banner protect" feature will force the bottom quarter of the screen to be always processed in VIDEO mode, regardless of the rest of the screen, which may be either video or FILM mode.




Image 16-4 Video pixels

- E Active Pixels




Image 16-5 Video clamping

3:2 pull-down

Method used to map the 24 fps of film onto the 30 fps (60 fields) or 25 fps (50 fields), so that one film frame occupies three video fields, the next two, etc. It means the two fields of every other video frame come from different film frames making operations such as rotoscoping impossible, and requiring care in editing. Some sophisticated equipment can unravel the 3:2 sequence to allow frame-by-frame treatment and subsequently re-compose 3:2. The 3:2 sequence repeats every five video frames and four film frames, the latter identified as A-D. Only film frame A is fully on a video frame and so exists at one time code only, making it the editable point of the video sequence.





2:2 pull-down

The process of transferring 24-frames/sec film format into video by repeating each frame (used for PAL DVD's) as two video fields. (AD)



Artefacts

Undesirable elements or defects in a video picture. These may occur naturally in the video process and must be eliminated in order to achieve a high-quality picture. Most common in analog are cross color and cross luminance. Most common in digital are macroblocks, which resemble pixelation of the video image.

16.5 Rename a file

How to rename a file

- 1. Select the FILE SERVICE menu (Loading a File, page 97).
- Select item RENAME by rotating the selection wheel on the Master or the ↑ or ↓ keys on the Remote Control.

The sub menu RENAME FILE (menu 16-10) appears on-screen and in the graphical display, including a list of all stored customer files.

- 3. Select the file whose name you desire to change by rotating the selection wheel on the Master or the ↑ or ↓ arrow keys on the Remote Control.
- 4. Press the selection wheel on the Master or the key ENTER on the Remote Control to confirm.

The selected file name, only the section file name with extension (extension is unchangeable), is displayed in the menu box RENAME FILE, requesting to enter new values. The first character is highlighted and can be changed. (menu 16-11)


- 5. Continue with changing the 8 characters consecutively as follows:
 - Pressing the cursor keys ← or → on the Remote Control or pressing the selection wheel on the Master allows to select the character position.






Image 17-1 Image orientation adjustment





17.4 Adjusting the Decoding Standard

About Decoding Standard

The possibility is offered to decode the NTSC video signals via the default American IRE standard (Decoding a NTSC signal using the European EBU standard may result in a greenish tint.) and the PAL/SECAM video signals via the European EBU standard.

When the PROJECTOR standard has been chosen, then, video signal are decoded based on the installed Color Parameters.



Choice of the color decoding standard is applicable on the Cine VERSUM 80 and Cine VERSUM 120 only.

Where to select the color decoding

- 1. Enter the MAIN menu and scroll through the sub menus, using the jog dial or the Remote Control until the Image Settings menu is displayed. (image 17-3)




Image 17-3 Color standard selection

17.5 White Peak Set up

About White Peak

In video centric applications true color reproduction is generally a priority over brightness. To achieve this a typical design will not utilize a white segment. This has the side effect of reducing the amount of light allowed through the color wheel, which reduces the overall brightness. To compensate for this a technique can applied called Spoke Light Capture (SLR).

The spokes are defined to be the time between colors. The DMD is normally kept in the "off" state during this time preventing any light from getting to the screen. If the light is passed trough the spokes, the average over time across them is made up of a mixture of the two adjacent colors. This will results in a secondary color. If these spokes are taken three at a time, over time they will sum up to white light. This "virtual white segment" is the basic principal of SLR and can yield a substantial boost to system brightness.

Where to set up the white Peak

- Fix 1. Enter the MAIN menu and scroll through the sub menus, using the jog dial or the Remote Control until the Image Settings menu is displayed. (image 17-4)
 - 2. Select item WHITE PEAK by rotating the jog dial on the Master or the up/down arrow keys on the Remote Control.
 - Press the jog dial on the Master or the ENTER key on the Remote Control to enable (On) or disable (Off) the white peak feature, status indicated between brackets.




Image 17-4 White peak set up

About Keystone correction

In case of an inclined projector mounting, side keystone correction has to be applied to the displayed picture.



Straight lines and the edges of the displayed image may appears jagged, when adjusting the Keystone setting.

The Installation menu includes the items KEYSTONE and GLOBAL KEYSTONE Yes/No. The latter allows to define if keystone correction may be applied to ALL files (Yes) or only to the active file (No).



Matching to the file on the respective input slots 1 to 8, an additional file is created on the corresponding input slot numbers, 91 to 98. Both matching files can contain different settings.

The 'Default Input Balance' is used to align the input balance of the different modules referring to standard input signals.



As standard input signals are required for the alignment of the Default Input Balance, this alignment has to be consider as FACTORY ALIGNED. Attempting to align the Default Input Balance can have serious consequences on the image performances. For that reason, the Default Input Balance adjustment has been made inaccessible.

Due to the signal distribution or the signal transmissions, a color imbalance can occurs. To allow the customer to be able to correct the imbalance per file, the alignment 'Input Balance', situated in the menu Advanced Settings, has been provided.

Observe the image on color dominance in the black and white areas of the displayed picture. If color dominance has been observed in one of the areas or in both, then proceed to the corresponding input balance adjustment.



Adjust the Color Saturation level to zero before starting the Input Balance adjustment.

17.9.1 Input Balance Selection

How to select the Input Balance

- 1. Check if the active source (File) is a RGB or YUV input signal.



17.10Phase adjustment for Computer signals

About Phase adjustment

When displaying computer patterns or graphics which are very detailed (tilting, vertical stripes, etc..) jitter in picture (missampling) may occur, causing horizontal stripes in portions of the screen. Should this occur, adjust 'Phase' for optimum computer image.

How to adjust the Phase

- 1. Check if the active source (File) is a RGB or YUV input signal.
- 2. Select the ADVANCED SETTINGS menu (menu 17-8).
- 3. Select item PHASE by rotating the jog dial on the Master or the up/down arrow keys on the Remote Control. (menu 17-23)
- 4. Press the jog dial on the Master or the key **ENTER** on the Remote Control to confirm.

The corresponding bar scale appears on-screen and in the graphical display of the Master. (image 17-10)

- 5. Adjust the Phase:

17.11Gamma Correction

Gamma Correction

Gamma is an image quality enhancement function that offers a richer image by brightening the darker portions of the image without altering the brightness of the brighter portions.



Gamma correction as well as Color Temperature set up are available (= appears in the on-screen menu and graphical display) ONLY when the display is remotely addressed with its unique address (Local settings) or selected via the Display list.



Only for the Cine VERSUM 80 HD2, three Gamma tables are added to the list, named Film, Graphics and Video.

How to set up the Gamma value

- 1. Enter the MAIN menu and select the sub menu IMAGE SETTINGS, using the jog dial or the Remote Control. (image 17-11)



About Color Temperature setting

This function can be used to adjust the color temperature to suit the type of image input to the display unit (DVD, Video, Computer image, TV broadcast etc..)






17.13Adjusting the Picture Controls

About picture controls

Picture controls as, Brightness, Contrast, Saturation and Tint can be remotely controlled using the Remote control (refer to the Owner's manual). The same functions are also available in the GUI, displayed on-screen and in the graphical display on the Master.






Image 17-18 Analog controls per display

18.1 Output Resolution set up

Why Output Resolution set up?


In case the digital video distribution system contains a combination of a Cine VERSUM 50 (Resolution 1280/768), a Cine VERSUM 80 (Resolution 1280/720) and/or a Cine VERSUM 120 (Resolution 1280/720), then the Cine VERSUM Master has to scale his output resolution to one of these displays.



When selecting the resolution of the Cine VERSUM 80 or the Cine VERSUM 120, then the picture on the Cine VERSUM 50 is displayed with a black bar at the bottom. The latter can occurs burning-in of the plasma screen. For that reason, selection of the output resolution referring to Cine VERSUM 50 is recommended. On the other hand, the highest output resolution occurs for the Cine VERSUM 80 and the Cine VERSUM 120 a lost of lines at the bottom.

How to set up the output resolution

- 1. Select the INSTALLATION menu (see "Loading a File", page 97).
- 2. Select item *OUTPUT* by rotating the jog dial on the Master or the ↑ or ↓ keys on the Remote Control. (menu 18-1)
- 3. Press the jog dial on the Master or the key ENTER on the Remote Control to toggle between SMALLEST or LARGEST.
 - Selecting 'Smallest': default output resolution to displays is 1280/720, occurring full image on the Cine VERSUM 80/Cine VERSUM 120 and a picture with a black bar on the bottom for the Cine VERSUM 50. (image 18-1)
 - Selecting 'Largest': default output resolution to displays is 1280/768, occurring full image on the Cine VERSUM 50 and lost of lines on bottom on Cine VERSUM 80/Cine VERSUM 120 (May be a problem with subtitles). (image 18-2)
- 4. Press the **EXIT** key on the Remote Control or select item BACK on the graphical display, by rotating the jog dial followed by pressing it, to leave the GUI menus.








Image 18-1 Picture on display

18.2 Display Internal Generated Pattern

How to display an internal pattern

In total 10 different internal patterns (Generated in the Cine VERSUM Master) can be displayed instead of the selected source. To select a pattern, carry out the following steps:

- 1. Select the INSTALLATION menu (see "Loading a File", page 97).
- 2. Select item INTERNAL PATTERN by rotating the jog dial on the Master or the ↑ or ↓ keys on the Remote Control.




Image 18-3 Available testpatterns

18.3 Shutdown Automatic when no signal

How to setup the automatic shutdown

If no input signal is available for a delay of minimum 40 seconds, the Cine VERSUM Master can be setup for automatic shutdown (Standby mode).

- 1. Select the INSTALLATION menu (see "Loading a File", page 97)
- 2. Select item WHEN NO SIGNAL by rotating the jog dial on the Master or the ↑ or ↓ keys on the Remote Control.
- 3. Press the jog dial on the Master or the key **ENTER** on the Remote Control to confirm.

The sub menu WHEN NO SIGNAL appears on-screen and in the graphical display, including the status of the shutdown, On or Off. If the status is 'Off', then the delay time can not be adjusted (text is displayed in gray). (menu 18-3)

- 4. Select item SHUTDOWN by rotating the jog dial on the Master or the ↑ or ↓ keys on the Remote Control.



- Press the key TEXT on the Remote Control. The OSD's, included Menu, Bar scale and Message are disabled. To reactivate




Image 18-5 Rename function search

How to change the name of a display


The Display Settings menu for that particular display appears on-screen and in the graphical display showing the specific items for the selected display (image 18-5).

- 6. Select item RENAME by rotating the selection wheel on the Master or the up/down arrow keys on the Remote Control.
- 7. Press the jog dial on the Master or the key ENTER on the Remote Control to confirm.






Image 19-1 Picture in Picture




Image 19-3 Position of the PIP window




About Data Transmission

Standards have been developed to insure compatibility between units provided by different manufacturers, and to allow for reasonable success in transferring data over specified distances and/or data rates.

RS232: Single-ended Data Transmission. The specification allows for data transmission from one transmitter to one receiver at relatively slow rates (up to 20K bits/second) and short distances (up to 50Ft.@ the maximum data rate).

RS422: Differential Data Transmission: This standard was designed for greater distances and higher Baud rates. Data rates of up to 100K bits/second and distances up to 4000Ft. can be accommodated with RS422.

How to set the interface standard

Refer to the manual of the connected control unit about the data transmission standard to be set.

- Select item INTERFACE in the Serial Communication menu by rotating the jog dial on the Master or the ↑ or ↓ keys on the Remote Control (Selecting the Transmission Speed, page 143.). (menu 20-8)
- 2. Press the jog dial on the Master or the **ENTER** key on the Remote Control to change the Interface standard between brackets to RS232 or RS422.
- 3. Press **EXIT** on the Remote Control or select *BACK* in the graphical display menu, rotating the jog dial to select and pressing to confirm, to exit the GUI.

If one of the communication parameters is not available, then the respective plus sign is replaced by a minus sign. This info can be useful for the technician if you call for technical assistance.









Image 21-3 Color wheel index for Cine VERSUM 80 only





Image 21-5 Test patterns Cine VERSUM Master




Image 21-7 Test patterns Cine VERSUM 120
