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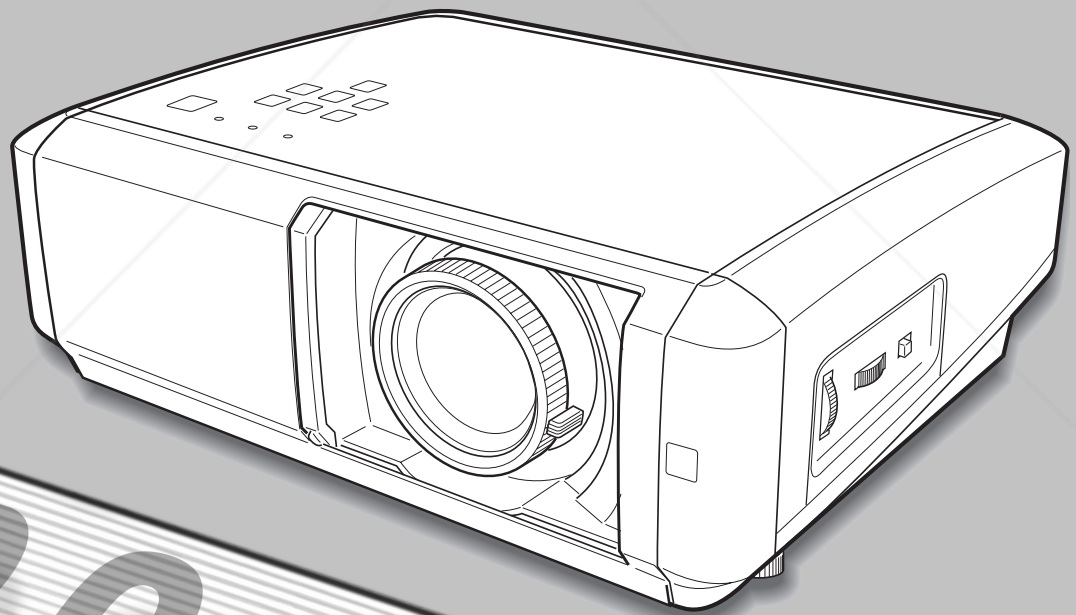

# Features and Design

This Multimedia Projector is designed with the most advanced technology for portability, durability, and ease of use. It uses built-in multimedia features, a palette of 1.07 billion colors, and matrix liquid crystal display (LCD) technology.

## ◆ Short Throw & Wide-Range Zoom Lens

The 2x Short Throw & Wide-Range Zoom Lens is capable of throwing a 100" diagonal image from a distance of 9.8' (3.0 m) to 20.0' (6.1 m).

## ◆ Lens Shift

The Lens Shift function provides a greater installation flexibility. You can use the projector at desired places without images being distorted (*see page 15*).

## ◆ Color Management

The Color management function allows you to adjust the details of picture colors to suit your preference and viewing environments (*see pages 31 – 32*).

## ◆ Twin Iris

The integration of the lens aperture and lamp aperture enhances the contrast and depth of the projected image.

## ◆ Compatibility

The projector accepts signals from multiple sources: computers, analog TV systems (PAL, SECAM, NTSC, NTSC4.43, PAL-M, and PAL-N), component video, S-video, RGB scart, and HDMI.

## ◆ Simple Computer System Setting

The Multi-scan system of the projector conforms to almost all computer output signals quickly (*see page 26*).

## ◆ 16 : 9 Wide Screen

The wide LCD panels with 1280 x 720 resolution (16:9 aspect ratio) can project the image from component video signals such as DVD players and HDTV devices in full screen.

## Interlace-Progressive Conversion

High-quality picture technology is available that converts an interlaced signal into a progressively-scanned one (*see page 29*).

## ◆ Automatic Slide Shutter

The automatic slide shutter protects the lens from dust and scratches. It opens and closes automatically as you press the POWER ON/STAND-BY button.

## ◆ Wide Selection of Image Modes

You can select an ideal image mode for the viewing environment or for your desired picture quality (*see page 27*). The four different kinds of images of your choice can also be stored (*see pages 28 – 32*).

## ◆ Power Management

The Power management function reduces power consumption and maintains the lamp life (*see page 39*).

## ◆ Logo

The Logo function allows you to customize the screen logo (*see page 38*). You can capture an image for the screen logo and use it for the starting-up display or between presentations.

## ◆ Lamp Control

The brightness of the projection lamp can be selected (*see pages 22, 29*).

## ◆ Multi-language Menu Display

Operation menu is available in 16 languages: English, German, French, Italian, Spanish, Portuguese, Dutch, Swedish, Finnish, Polish, Hungarian, Romanian, Russian, Chinese, Korean, and Japanese (*see page 36*).

## ◆ Selectable Setting Position

The Mounting function provides a proper image position (up/down and left/right) depending on the setting position of the projector such as ceiling mounting or wall-hanging (*see page 37*).

## ◆ Two HDMI Terminals

The projector has two HDMI (High Definition Multimedia Interface) terminals. Simple connection with digital equipment is offered through these terminals.

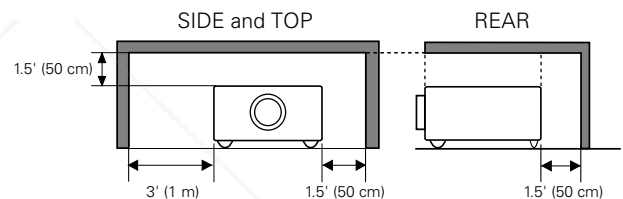

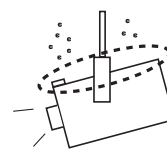
- This projector produces intense light from the projection lens. Avoid staring directly into the lens as much as possible, otherwise eye damage could result. Be especially careful that children do not stare directly into the beam.
- Install the projector in a proper position. Otherwise it may result in fire hazard.
- Allowing the proper amount of space on the top, sides, and rear of the projector cabinet is critical for proper air circulation and cooling of the unit. The dimensions shown here indicate the minimum space required. If the projector is to be built into a compartment or similarly enclosed, these minimum distances must be maintained.
- Do not cover the ventilation slot on the projector. Heat build-up can reduce the service life of your projector, and can also be dangerous.



- If the projector is unused for an extended time, unplug the projector from the power outlet.



## CAUTION ON HANGING FROM THE CEILING



When hanging the projector from the ceiling, clean the air intake vents, air filters, and the top of the projector periodically with a vacuum cleaner. If you leave the projector unclean for a long time, the cooling fans can be clogged with dust, and it may cause a breakdown or a disaster.

# Safety Instructions

All the safety and operating instructions should be read before the product is operated.

Read all of the instructions given here and retain them for later use. Unplug this projector from AC power supply before cleaning. Do not use liquid or aerosol cleaners. Use a damp cloth for cleaning.

Follow all warnings and instructions marked on the projector.

For added protection to the projector during lightning storm, or when it is left unattended and unused for long periods of time, unplug it from the wall outlet. This will prevent damage due to lightning and power line surges.

Do not expose this unit to rain or use near water... for example, in a wet basement, near a swimming pool, etc...

Do not use attachments not recommended by the manufacturer as they may cause hazards.

Do not place this projector on an unstable cart, stand, or table. The projector may fall, causing serious injury to a child or adult, and serious damage to the projector. Use only with a cart or stand recommended by the manufacturer, or sold with the projector. Wall or shelf mounting should follow the manufacturer's instructions, and should use a mounting kit approved by the manufacturers.

An appliance and cart combination should be moved with care. Quick stops, excessive force, and uneven surfaces may cause the appliance and cart combination to overturn.



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Slots and openings in the back and bottom of the cabinet are provided for ventilation, to insure reliable operation of the equipment and to protect it from overheating.

The openings should never be covered with cloth or other materials, and the bottom opening should not be blocked by placing the projector on a bed, sofa, rug, or other similar surface. This projector should never be placed near or over a radiator or heat register.

This projector should not be placed in a built-in installation such as a bookcase unless proper ventilation is provided.

Never push objects of any kind into this projector through cabinet slots as they may touch dangerous voltage points or short out parts that could result in a fire or electric shock.

Never spill liquid of any kind on the projector.

Do not install the projector near the ventilation duct of air-conditioning equipment.

This projector should be operated only from the type of power source indicated on the marking label. If you are not sure of the type of power supplied, consult your authorized dealer or local power company.

Do not overload wall outlets and extension cords as this can result in fire or electric shock. Do not allow anything to rest on the power cord. Do not locate this projector where the cord may be damaged by persons walking on it.

Do not attempt to service this projector yourself as opening or removing covers may expose you to dangerous voltage or other hazards. Refer all servicing to qualified service personnel.

Unplug this projector from wall outlet and refer servicing to qualified service personnel under the following conditions:

- When the power cord or plug is damaged or frayed.
- If liquid has been spilled into the projector.
- If the projector has been exposed to rain or water.
- If the projector does not operate normally by following the operating instructions. Adjust only those controls that are covered by the operating instructions as improper adjustment of other controls may result in damage and will often require extensive work by a qualified technician to restore the projector to normal operation.
- If the projector has been dropped or the cabinet has been damaged.
- When the projector exhibits a distinct change in performance, this indicates a need for service.

When replacement parts are required, be sure the service technician has used replacement parts specified by the manufacturer that have the same characteristics as the original part. Unauthorized substitutions may result in fire, electric shock, or injury to persons.

Upon completion of any service or repairs to this projector, ask the service technician to perform routine safety checks to determine that the projector is in safe operating condition.

# Safety Instructions

## Air Circulation

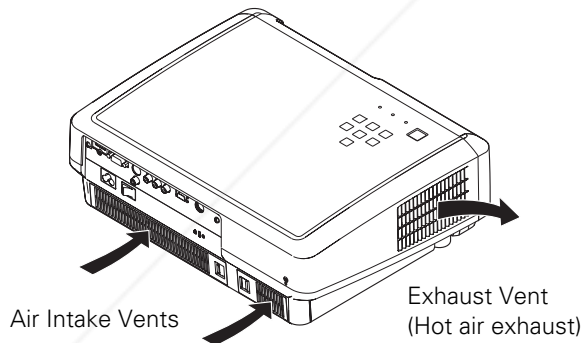
Openings in the cabinet are provided for ventilation. To ensure reliable operation of the product and to protect it from overheating, these openings must not be blocked or covered.

### CAUTION

Hot air is exhausted from the exhaust vent. When using or installing the projector, the following precautions should be taken.

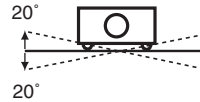
- Do not put any flammable objects or spray can near the projector. Hot air is exhausted from the ventilation holes.
- Keep the exhaust vent at least 3' (1 m) away from any objects.
- Do not touch a peripheral part of the exhaust vent, especially screws and metallic part. This area will become hot while the projector is being used.
- Do not put anything on the projector. Objects put on the cabinet will not only get damaged but also cause fire hazard by heat.

Cooling fans are provided to cool down the projector. The fan's running speed is changed according to the temperature inside the projector.



## Installing the Projector in Proper Position

Install the projector properly. Improper installation may reduce the lamp life and cause fire hazard.



Do not tilt the projector more than 20 degrees from side to side.



**NO DOWNWARD**

Do not point the projector down to project an image.



**NO SIDEWARD**

Do not put the projector on either side to project an image.

## Moving the Projector

When moving the projector, make sure that the automatic slide shutter is closed, retract the adjustable feet, and lock the lens with the Lens Shift Lock to prevent damage to the lens and cabinet.

When the projector is unused for an extended period, put it into a suitable case.

Care must be taken when handling the projector; do not drop, bump, subject it to strong forces, or put other things on the cabinet.

### CAUTION IN CARRYING OR TRANSPORTING THE PROJECTOR

- Do not drop or bump the projector, otherwise damages or malfunctions may result.
- When carrying the projector, use a suitable carrying case.
- Do not transport the projector by courier or any other transport service in an unsuitable transport case. This may cause damage to the projector. For information about transporting the projector by courier or any other transport service, consult your dealer.
- Do not put the projector in a case before it is cooled enough.

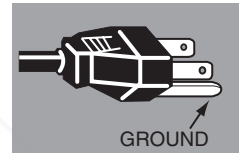
## AC Power Cord Requirement

The AC Power Cord supplied with this projector meets the requirement for use in the country you purchased it.

### AC Power Cord for the United States and Canada:

AC Power Cord used in the United States and Canada is listed by the Underwriters Laboratories (UL) and certified by the Canadian Standard Association (CSA).

AC Power Cord has a grounding-type AC line plug. This is a safety feature to be sure that the plug will fit into the power outlet. Do not try to defeat this safety feature. Should you be unable to insert the plug into the outlet, contact your electrician.



### AC Power Cord for the United Kingdom:

This cord is already fitted with a moulded plug incorporating a fuse, the value of which is indicated on the pin face of the plug. Should the fuse need to be replaced, an ASTA approved BS 1362 fuse must be used of the same rating, marked thus  $\diamond$ . If the fuse cover is detachable, never use the plug with the cover omitted. If a replacement fuse cover is required, ensure it is of the same colour as that visible on the pin face of the plug (i.e. red or orange). Connect the component video output signal to these jacks (p.16).

**④ SERVICE PORT**

This jack is used to service the projector.

Connect the HDMI output signal from video equipment to these terminals (p.17).

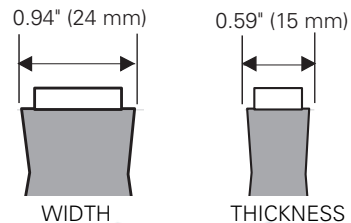

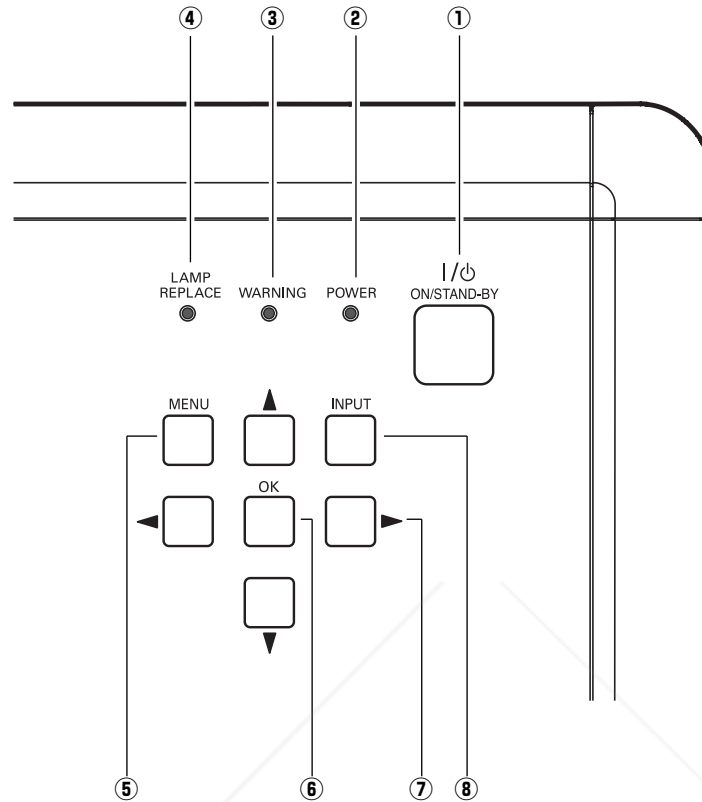

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## Top Control



**① POWER ON/STAND-BY button**

Turn the projector on or off (pp.18, 19).

**② POWER indicator**

- Lights red while the projector is in stand-by mode.
- Lights green during operations.
- Blinks red during the cooling-off period.
- Blinks green in the Power management mode (p.39).
- Blinks orange when the automatic slide shutter is closed during operations (p.50).

**③ WARNING indicator**

- Lights red light when the projector detects an abnormal condition.
- Blinks red when the internal temperature of the projector exceeds the operating range (pp.42, 50).

**④ LAMP REPLACE indicator**

Lights yellow light when the projection lamp reaches its end of life (pp.47, 50).

**⑤ MENU button**

Open or close the On-Screen Menu (p.20).

**⑥ OK button**

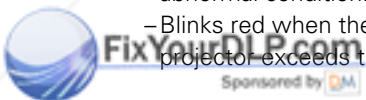
Execute the item selected or use it to access the submenu items (p.20).

**⑦ POINT ▲▼◀▶ buttons**

Select an item or adjust the setting values in the On-Screen Menu, or use them to pan the image in the Normal through mode (p.35).

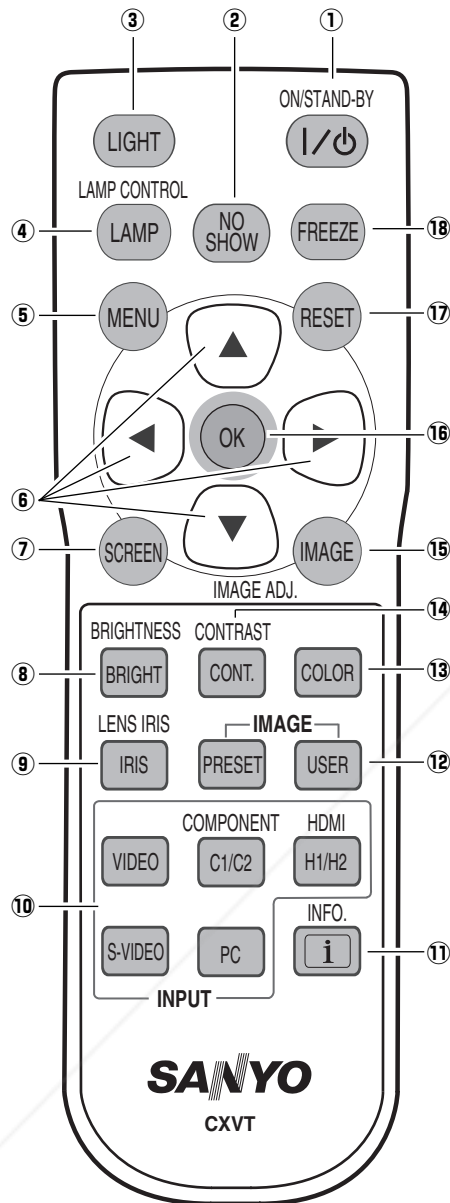

Adjust the brightness of a projected image (pp.23, 28).

Adjust the lens iris (pp.23, 29).
- ⑩ **INPUT buttons**  
Select an input source (p.24).
- ⑪ **INFO. button**  
Display the input source information (p.41).
- ⑫ **IMAGE buttons**  
Select an image level (pp.23, 27).
- ⑬ **COLOR button**  
Adjust the color intensity of a projected image (pp.23, 28).
- ⑭ **CONTRAST button**  
Adjust the contrast of a projected image (pp.23, 28).

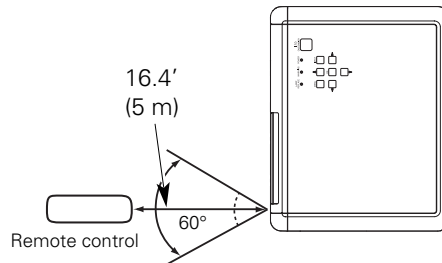


To ensure safe operation, observe the following precautions:

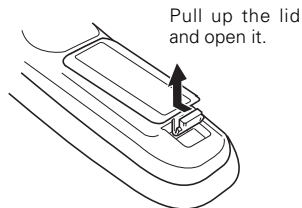
### Remote Control Operating Range

Point the remote control toward the projector (Infrared Remote Receiver) when pressing any buttons. Maximum operating range for the remote control is about 16.4' (5 m) and 60 degrees in front of the projector.

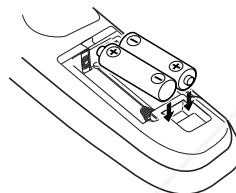


### Remote Control Battery Installation

**1** Open the battery compartment lid.

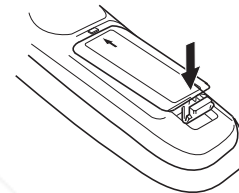


**2** Install new batteries into the compartment.



**Two AA size batteries**  
For correct polarity (+ and -), be sure battery terminals are in contact with pins in the compartment.

**3** Replace the compartment lid.



\* When the batteries of the remote control are replaced, the remote control code automatically returns to the initial code (Code 1) (p.39).



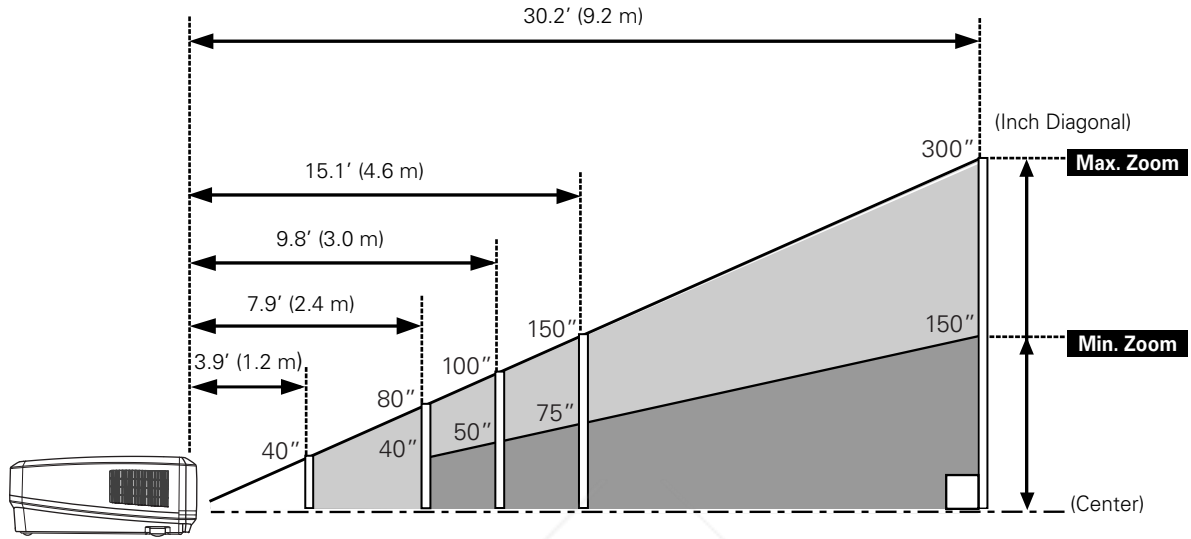
To insure safe operation, please observe the following precautions:

- Use two (2) AA or LR6 type alkaline batteries.
- Always replace batteries in sets.
- Do not use a new battery with a used battery.
- Avoid contact with water or liquid.
- Do not expose the remote control to moisture or heat.
- Do not drop the remote control.
- If the battery has leaked on the remote control, carefully wipe the case clean and install new batteries.
- Risk of explosion if battery is replaced by an incorrect type.
- Dispose of used batteries according to the instructions.

# Installation

## Positioning the Projector

This projector is designed to project on a flat projection surface having a focus range of 3.9' (1.2 m) to 30.2' (9.2 m) at maximum zoom and 7.9' (2.4 m) to 30.2' (9.2 m) at minimum zoom. Refer to the figure and table below for the screen size and distance between the projector and screen.

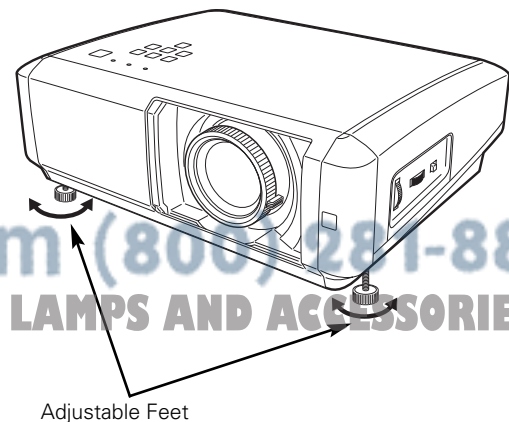
### Notes:

- The brightness in the room has a great influence on picture quality. It is recommended to limit ambient lighting in order to obtain the best image.
- All measurements are approximate and may vary from the actual sizes.

## Adjustable Feet

Projection angle can be adjusted up to 7.7 degrees with the adjustable feet.

- 1 Rotate the adjustable feet and tilt the projector to the proper height; to raise the feet, rotate the both feet clockwise.
  - 2 To lower or to retract the adjustable feet, rotate the both feet counterclockwise.
- Key: One position of the projected image can be corrected by menu operation (p.36).



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## Connecting the AC Power Cord

This projector uses nominal input voltages of 100 – 120 V or 200 – 240 V AC and it automatically selects a correct input voltage. It is designed to work with the single-phase power systems having a grounded neutral conductor. To reduce the risk of electrical shock, do not plug into any other type of power system.

If you are not sure of the type of power being supplied, consult your authorized dealer or service station.

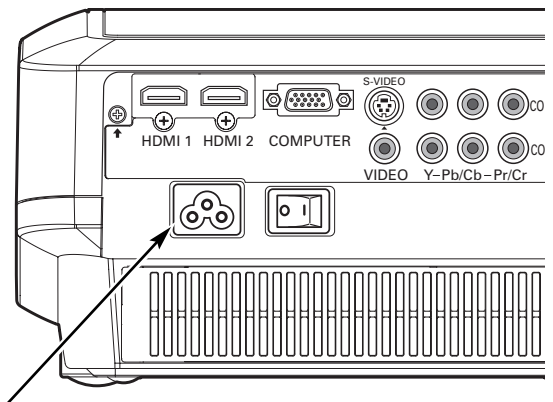
Connect the projector with all peripheral equipment before turning it on.



### CAUTION

For safety, unplug the AC power cord when the projector is not in use.

When the projector is connected to an outlet with the AC power cord and the Main On/Off switch is on, it is in stand-by mode and consumes a little electric power. Turn the Main On/Off switch off when the projector is not in use.







Connect the AC power cord (supplied) to the projector.

The AC outlet must be near this equipment and must be easily accessible.

## Moving the Lens

The projection lens can be moved up and down or left and right manually with the Lens Shift Rings, enabling you to adjust the position of a projected image. After adjusting the position, lock the lens with the Lens Shift Lock.

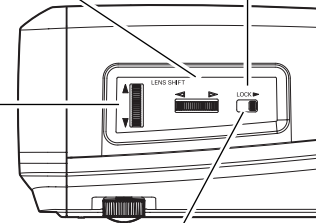
Move the projection lens to the left or right with the Horizontal Lens Shift Ring.

Horizontal Lens Shift Ring (Left/Right)

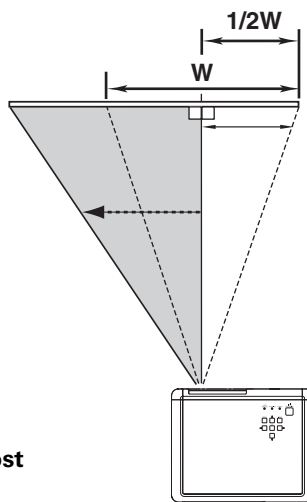

Vertical Lens Shift Ring (Up/Down)

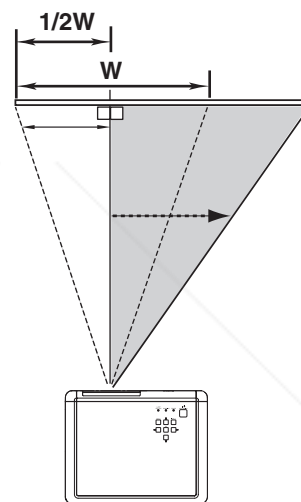


Before using the Lens Shift Rings, make sure that this lock is released.

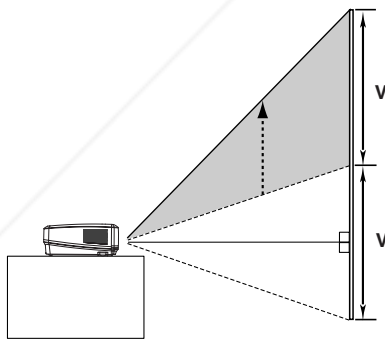

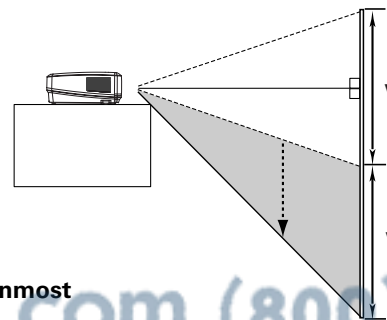

- The Lens Shift Rings are locked at the factory. Make sure that the Lens Shift Lock is released before using the Lens Shift Rings.



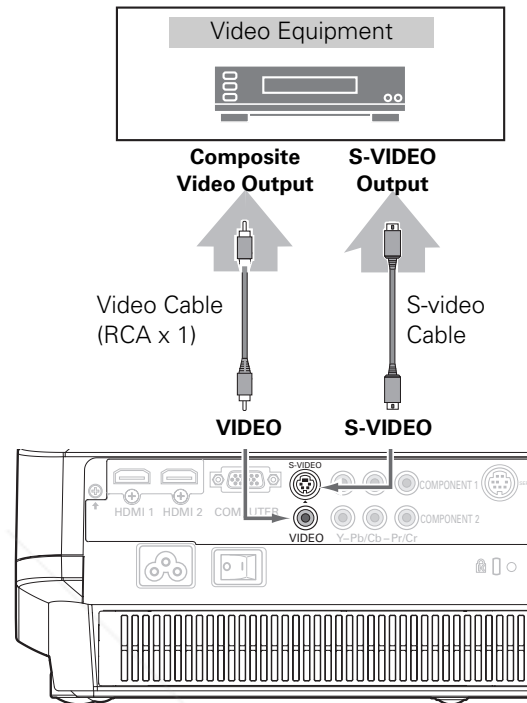

# Basic Operation

## Turning On the Projector

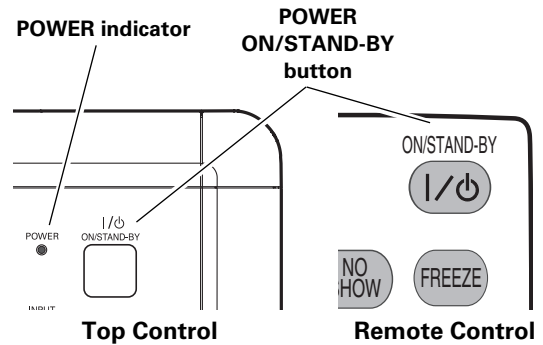
- 1 Complete peripheral connections (with a computer, VCR, etc.) before turning on the projector.
- 2 Connect the projector's AC power cord into an AC outlet and turn the Main On/Off switch on. The POWER indicator lights red.
- 3 Press the POWER ON/STAND-BY button on the top control or on the remote control.

The POWER indicator turns green and the cooling fans start to operate. As the automatic slide shutter opens, a preparation display appears on the screen and the countdown starts.

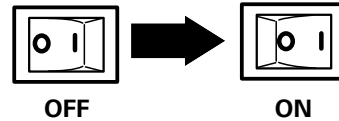
- 4 After the countdown, the input source that was selected the last time appears on the screen.

✓ **Notes:**

- If the automatic slide shutter does not open properly, the projector will not be turned on and the POWER indicator will blink orange. Press the POWER ON/STAND-BY button again to restart.
- When "Countdown off" or "Off" is selected in the Display function, the countdown will not be displayed on the screen (p.38).
- During the countdown period, all operations are invalid.



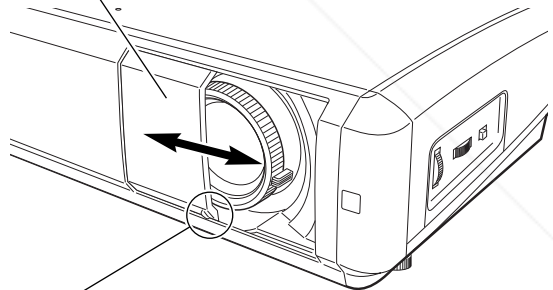

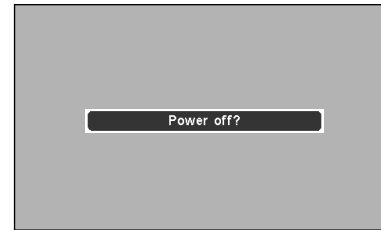
## Turning Off the Projector

- 1 Press the POWER ON/STAND-BY button on the top control or on the remote control. "Power off?" appears on the screen. Press the POWER ON/STAND-BY button again to turn off the projector.

When the Power off confirmation function is set to "Off," the projector can be turned off without the confirmation message. (See "Power off confirmation" on page 38.)

The automatic slide shutter closes and the POWER indicator starts to blink red. The blinking continues for about 60 seconds while the cooling fans are running.

- 2 When the projector is cooled down enough to be turned on again, the POWER indicator becomes red. Then you can turn the Main On/Off switch off and unplug the AC power cord.



"Power off?" disappears after 4 seconds.



TO MAINTAIN LIFE OF LAMP, ONCE YOU TURN PROJECTOR ON, WAIT AT LEAST FIVE (5) MINUTES BEFORE TURNING IT OFF.

DO NOT UNPLUG AC POWER CORD WHILE COOLING FANS ARE RUNNING OR BEFORE POWER INDICATOR STOPS BLINKING. OTHERWISE IT WILL RESULT IN SHORTENING LAMP LIFE.

### ✓ Notes:

- If the automatic slide shutter is closed during operation, the projector is automatically turned off for safety. Be sure to turn off the projector by pressing the POWER ON/STAND-BY button on the top control or on the remote control after use.
- While the POWER indicator is blinking, the lamp is being cooled down and the projector cannot be turned on. Wait until the POWER indicator becomes red to be turned on again.
- Do not operate the projector continuously without rest. Continuous use may result in shortening the lamp life. Turn off the projector and let stand for about an hour in every 24 hours.
- The running speed of cooling fans is changed according to the temperature inside the projector.
- If the WARNING indicator blinks or emits red light, see "Warning Indicator" on page 42.
- Do not put the projector in a case before it is cooled enough.

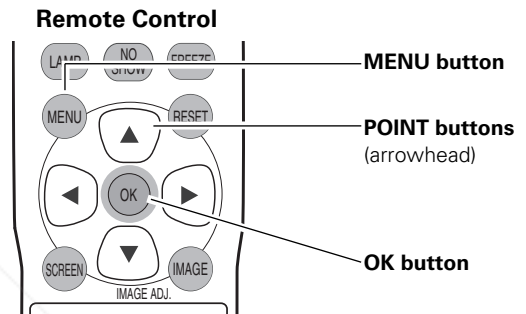
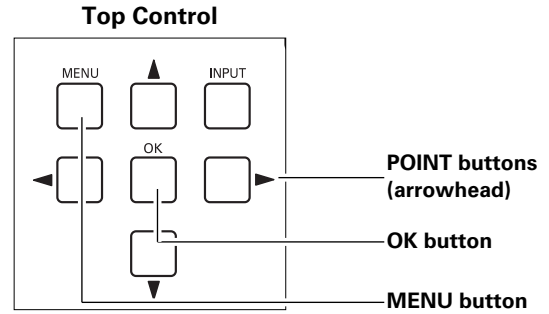


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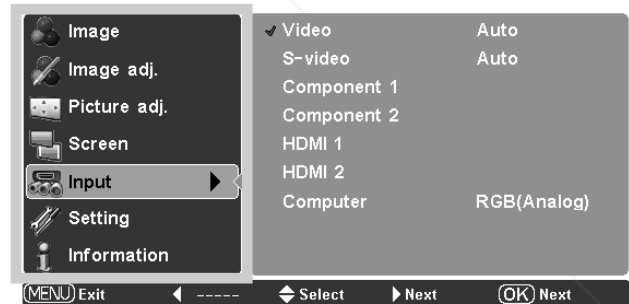
## How to Operate the On-Screen Menu

The projector can be adjusted or set via the On-Screen Menu. The menus have a hierarchical structure, with a main menu that is divided into submenus, which are further divided into other submenus. For each adjustment and setting procedure, refer to respective sections in this manual.

- 1** Press the MENU button on the top control or on the remote control to display the On-Screen Menu.
- 2** Use the Point ▲▼ buttons to highlight or select a main menu item. Press the Point ► or OK buttons to access the submenu items. (The selected item is highlighted in ORANGE.)
- 3** Use the Point ▲▼ buttons to select the desired submenu item and press the Point ► or OK buttons to access the selected item.
- 4** Use the Point ◀▶ or OK buttons to adjust the setting or switch between each option and press the OK or Point ► buttons to activate it and return to the submenu.
- 5** Press the Point ◀ button to return to the main menu; press the MENU button again to exit the On-Screen Menu.

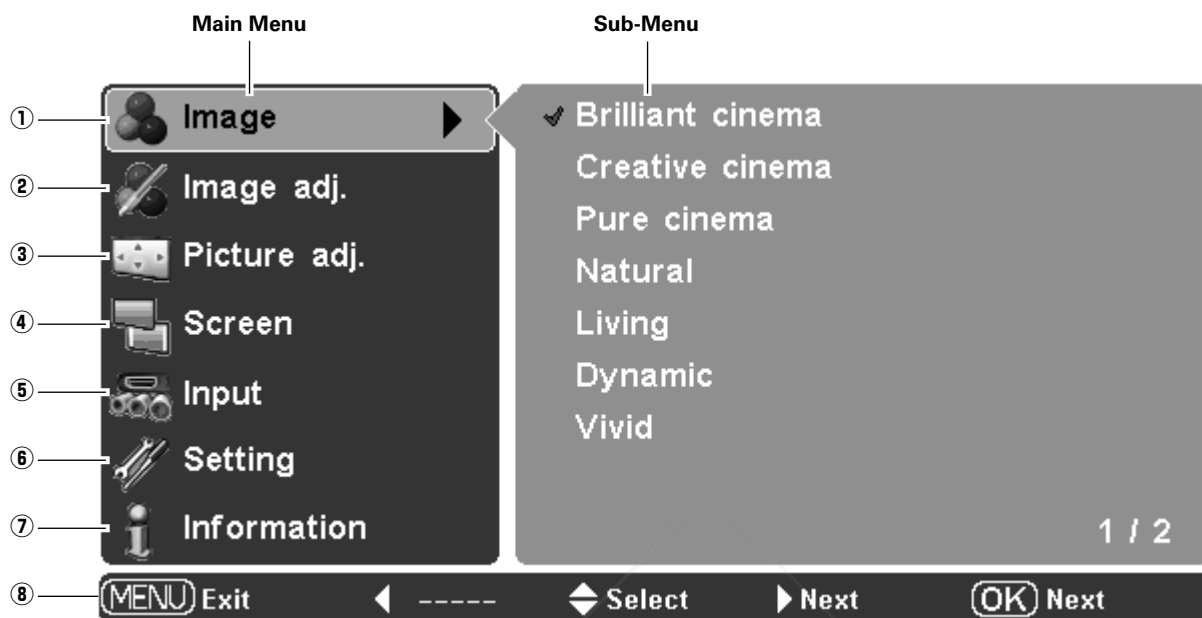

Select an input source from among Video, S-video, Component 1, Component 2, HDMI 1, HDMI 2, and Computer. For Video and S-video inputs, choose a video system from AUTO, PAL, SECAM, NTSC, NTSC4.43, PAL-M, and PAL-N (pp.24 – 26).

⑥ **Setting**

Change various settings; Language, Advanced menu, Menu position, Keystone, Mounting, Rear, HDMI setup, Background, Display, Logo, Power off confirmation, Capture, Power management, Remote control, Shutter demo, Cleaning, Panel adjustment, Highland, Lamp counter reset, and Factory default (pp.36 – 40).

⑦ **Information**

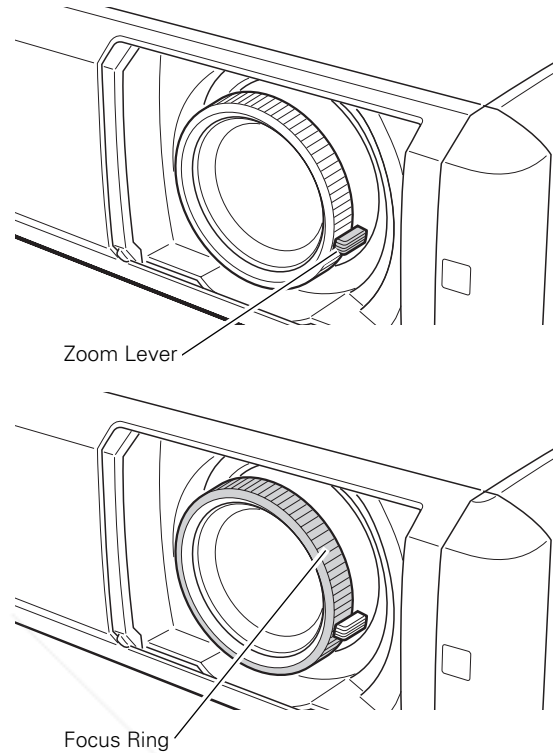
Display the input source information: Signal, H-sync freq., V-sync freq., Image mode, Screen size, Input source, and the Lamp status of the projected screen as well as the Lamp Time (p.41).

⑧ **Guide**

The key operation is displayed.

## Zoom and Focus Adjustment

Rotate the Zoom Lever to zoom in and out.  
Rotate the Focus Ring to focus the image.



## Remote Control Operation

For some frequently used operations, using the remote control is advisable. Just pressing one of the buttons enables you to have the desired operation quickly, and no need for calling up the On-Screen Menu.

### LIGHT button

Press the LIGHT button to light up the remote control buttons. The light is automatically turned off when no buttons on the remote control are pressed for 10 seconds.

### FREEZE button

Press the FREEZE button to freeze the picture on the screen. To cancel, press the FREEZE button again or press any other button.

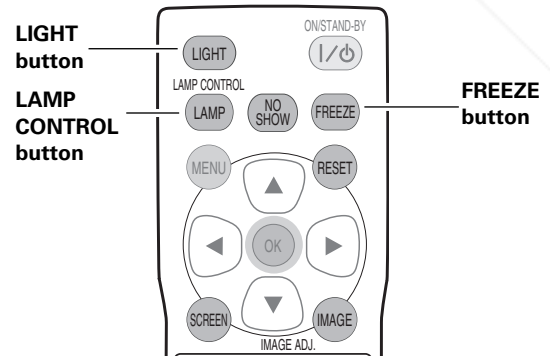

#### Vivid

For viewing contrasty images to a maximum extent.

## Lamp control

This function allows you to change the brightness of the screen. Use the Point ◀▶ buttons to select the desired lamp mode. You can also select the lamp mode by pressing the LAMP CONTROL button on the remote control.

- ☹ Normal . . . . . Normal brightness.
- ☹<sub>A1</sub> Auto 1 . . . . . The brightness according to the input signal.
- ☹<sub>A2</sub> Auto 2 . . . . . Less bright and lower-sound than Auto 1.
- ☹ Eco . . . . . Lower brightness reduces the lamp power consumption.

The lamp mode is automatically switched to "Eco" under no signal input.

## Gamma

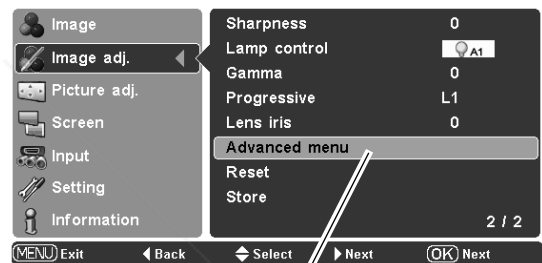
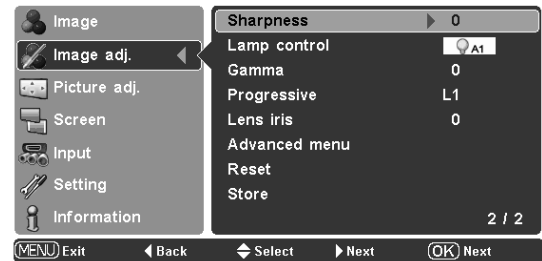
## Progressive

An interlaced video signal can be displayed in progressive. Use the Point ◀▶ buttons to select the desired options.

- Film . . . . . For watching a film. With this function, the projector reproduces pictures faithful to the original film quality; it operates on 3-2 and 2-2 pulldown video sources.

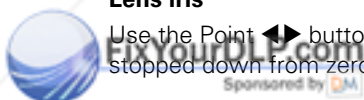

## Advanced menu

### Auto black stretch

Enhance blacks in bright areas of an image. It can be set in 4 steps (Off/L1/L2/L3).

### Contrast enhancement

Adjust the contrast in bright scenes in 4 steps (Off/L1/L2/L3).

### Transient improvement

Adjust the sharpness of image outlines in 4 steps (Off/L1/L2/L3).

### Color management

Adjust the level, phase, and gamma of any color. You can store up to eight (8) color management data. For details, see "COLOR MANAGEMENT" on the next page.

### Color list

Select a color list from the following options:

- List 0 . . . No color correction
- List 1 . . . Overall correction of memory colors
- List 2 . . . Skin color correction
- List 3 . . . Enhancement of the brightness of primary colors
- User . . . User correction from the above color lists

#### ✓ Notes:

- "User" option will not be displayed unless the Color management function is executed.
- If no user image mode is stored, the factory default value is displayed.

### Dynamic gamma

Set the level for Dynamic gamma correction. Select from the following options:

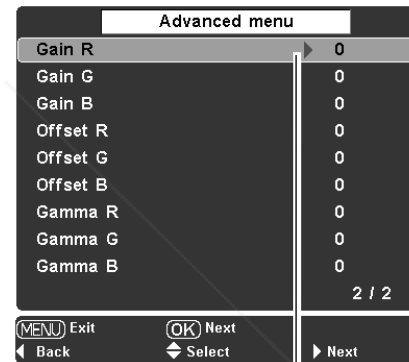

## COLOR MANAGEMENT

### COLOR MANAGEMENT LIST

Select Color management in the Advanced menu and then press the OK or Point ► buttons. The COLOR MANAGEMENT LIST appears. You can store up to eight (8) color management data in the list.

In the COLOR MANAGEMENT LIST, the adjusted color data are check marked reflecting the changes in the image. You can choose whether to apply the data in the list to the image.

Clear the check mark if you do not want to apply the data; select the check mark and then press the OK button. The check mark disappears.

If you want to readjust the color, select a color data box in the list and press the OK button. The COLOR SELECTION window appears and you can readjust the color. See below for color selection.

If you want to delete a particular data in the list, select the DEL box and then press the OK button. A confirmation box appears. Select [Yes] and then press the OK button.

Press the OK button when selecting the following items.

- ALL DEL . . . . . Delete all the data in the list. Press the OK button and a confirmation box appears. Select [Yes] and press the OK button.
- COLOR M. . . . . Go to COLOR SELECTION.
- EXIT . . . . . Exit the Color management mode and return to the Advanced menu. To store the adjusted data, see "Store" on the next page.

Press the MENU button when you want to return to the Advanced menu.

### COLOR SELECTION

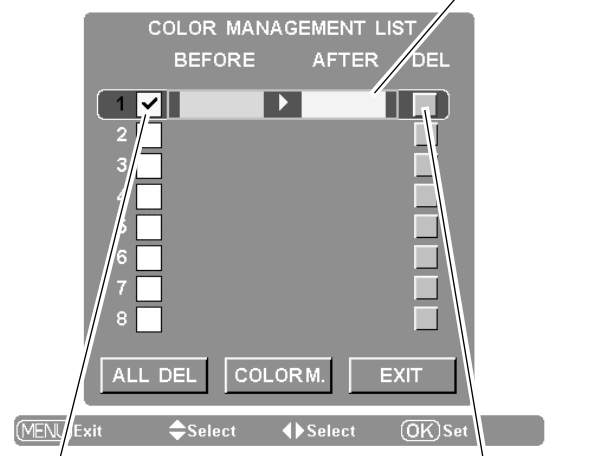
Press the OK button when "COLOR M." in the COLOR MANAGEMENT LIST is selected. The COLOR MANAGEMENT LIST disappears and the Color management pointer appears.

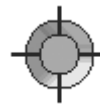

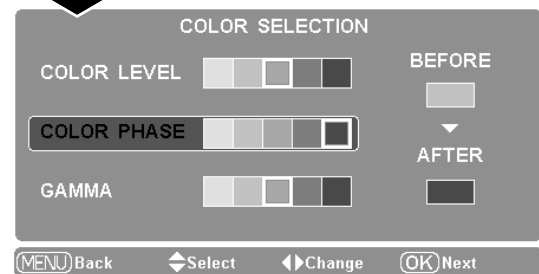

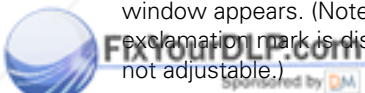
Use the Point ▲▼◀▶ buttons to move the pointer to a spot where you want to adjust the color and then press the OK button. The COLOR SELECTION window appears.



After adjusting COLOR LEVEL, COLOR PHASE, and GAMMA, press the OK button.

Go to the COLOR MANAGEMENT LIST.

To store the adjusted data, exit the Color management mode and go to "Store" in the Image adj. Menu (see page 32).



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# Image Adjustment

## Reset

To reset the adjusted data, select Reset and press the Point ► or OK buttons. A confirmation box appears. Select [Yes] and then press the OK button. All adjustments return to their previous figures. You can also reset the adjusted data by pressing the RESET button on the remote control.

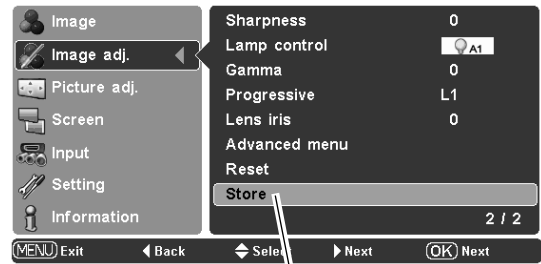
## Store

To store the adjusted data, select Store and press the Point ► or OK buttons. The User Image Mode Menu appears. Use the Point ▲▼ buttons to choose one of the four (4) user image modes and press the OK or Point ► buttons. A confirmation box appears. Select [Yes] and then press the OK button.

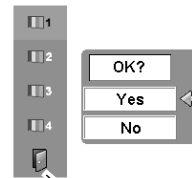
To exit the User Image Mode Menu, go to the Quit icon and press the OK or Point ► buttons. The stored data can be called up by selecting "User image 1 – 4" in the Image Mode Selection on page 27.

### ✓ Notes:

- If you change the image mode (see page 27) or turn off the POWER without storing adjusted settings, all the adjusted settings will be reset.
- When resetting, the adjusted data in Advanced menu will be reset whether or not Advanced menu in the Setting Menu is "On." See page 36.



Press the Point ► or OK buttons to store the adjusted data. The User Image Mode Menu appears.



Choose one of the four (4) user image modes with the Point ▲▼ buttons and press the OK or Point ► buttons. The confirmation box appears. Select [Yes] and then press the OK button.

# Picture Adjustment

## Picture Position and Screen Adjustment

Some input source employ special signal formats which may not be tuned by the auto-tuning system of this projector. Picture Adjustment enables you to precisely adjust several parameters manually to match those signal formats. The parameters manually adjusted is stored for every input.

- 1 Press the Point ▲▼ buttons to select the Picture adj. Menu and press the Point ► or OK buttons to access the submenu items.
- 2 Use the Point ▲▼ buttons to select the desired item and press the Point ► or OK buttons to access the selected item. The adjustment bar is displayed.
- 3 Use the Point ◀▶ buttons to adjust the setting values and press the OK button.

### Overscan

Use the Point ◀▶ buttons to adjust the overscan area. It works only to decrease the overscanned portion of the screen (from 0 to +10).

### Horizontal

Use the Point ◀▶ buttons to adjust the horizontal picture position (from -100 to +100).

### Vertical

Use the Point ◀▶ buttons to adjust the vertical picture position (from -100 to +100).

### Auto adj.

When the input signal is from computers, select Auto adj. and press the Point ► or OK buttons so that it automatically adjust Fine sync, Total dots, and Horizontal and Vertical positions to conform to your computer.

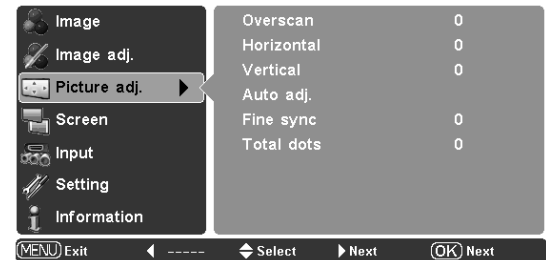
### Fine sync

Use the Point ◀▶ buttons to adjust the value, eliminating a flicker from the image displayed (from 0 to +31).

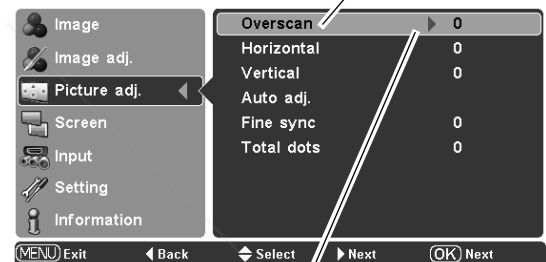
### Total dots

Use the Point ◀▶ buttons to adjust the number of total dots in one horizontal period to match your PC image (from -100 to +100).

- The Auto adj. function cannot be operated with the video input, some incompatible computer input and digital signals.
- Fine sync and Total dots cannot be operated when the video signal format is 480i or 575i and with some incompatible computer input and digital signals.
- The Picture adj. Menu cannot be operated without an input signal.

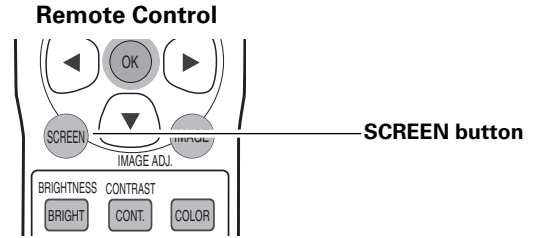

With the input signals other than 1080i or 720p, this function is used to project a letterboxed picture (the 4:3 aspect ratio picture with a black bar at the top and bottom) at the wide video aspect ratio of 16:9.

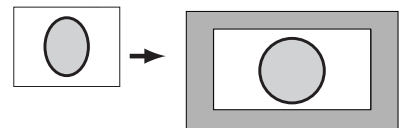

- When the video signal format is 720p, 1080i, or HDTV, the Screen Menu cannot be selected except for Full, Zoom, Caption in, and Natural wide 2.
  - When Normal is selected with a computer input, the image is projected at the inputted resolution.
  - This projector cannot display any resolution higher than 1920 x 1080. If your computer's resolution is higher than that, lower the resolution before connecting to the projector.

### Advanced menu

When this function is "On," the Advanced menu in the Image Level Adjustment can be selected. Press the Point ► or OK buttons to switch On/Off. See "Image Level Adjustment" on page 30 for details.

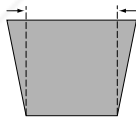

This function is used to change the position of the On-Screen Menu. Select Menu position and press the Point ► or OK buttons. The Menu position screen appears. Use the Point ▲▼◀▶ buttons to select the desired position and press the OK button.

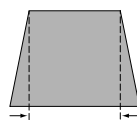

- Countdown Off . . . Show the input image instead of the countdown when turning on the projector. Use this function when you want to project the image as early as possible even when the lamp is not bright enough.
- Off . . . . . Hide the On-Screen Displays except;
  - On-Screen Menu
  - "Power off?"
  - "No signal" for Power management (p.39)
  - "Please wait ..."
  - Color management operation screen (p.31)
  - Panning dialog box when Normal through is selected in the Screen Menu (p.35)

## Logo

This function decides on the starting-up display from among the following options. Press the Point ► or OK buttons to switch between each option.

- User . . . . . Show the Image you captured.
- Default . . . . . Show the factory-set logo.
- Off . . . . . Show the Countdown display only.

### ✓ Note:

- "User" option cannot be selected without capturing an image.

## Power off confirmation

When this function is set to "On," a confirmation dialog box with "Power off?" is displayed when turning off the projector (p.19). Press the Point ► or OK buttons to switch On/Off.

## Capture

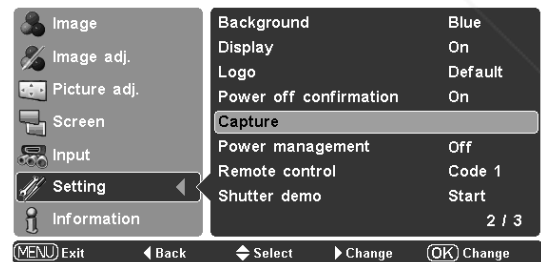
This function enables you to capture an image being projected to use it for the starting-up display or interval of presentations. Select Capture and press the Point ► or OK buttons. The confirmation box appears and select [Yes] to capture the projected image. The captured image will be displayed the next time the projector is turned on.

To cancel the Capture function, select [No].

### ✓ Notes:

- A signal from a computer can be captured up to XGA (1024 x 768).
- The image that has been adjusted in the Image adj. Menu will not be reflected even if it is captured.
- When capturing the image that has been adjusted by the Keystone function, the adjusted data is automatically reset and the projector captures an image without keystone correction.
- If the Capture function fails to capture an image or stops capturing halfway, the On-Screen Menu returns to the Capture item.
- The Capture function cannot be operated with unsupported signals.
- When starting to capture a new image, the previously stored image is cleared even if you cancel the capturing.

Select [Yes] to capture the projected image.

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**Power management**

For reducing power consumption as well as maintaining the lamp life, the Power management function turns off the projection lamp when the projector is not used for a certain period.

When this function is "On" and if the input signal is interrupted and no button is pressed for more than 30 seconds, the timer display with "No signal" appears on the screen. It starts the countdown until the lamp is turned off. The countdown time is set to five (5) minutes.

When the countdown time has elapsed, the lamp is turned off to cool itself down. The POWER indicator is blinking red during the cooling-off period. When the lamp has been fully cooled down, the POWER indicator changes to green blinking. In this condition, the projection lamp can be turned on when the input signal is reconnected or any button on the top control or remote control is pressed.

Press the Point ► or OK buttons to switch On/Off.

**Remote control**

Two different remote control codes are assigned to this projector: the factory-set code (Code 1) and the secondary code (Code 2). This switching function prevents interference from other remote controls when several projectors or video equipment next to each other are used at the same time.

When operating the projector in Code 2, the code for both the projector and the remote control must be switched to Code 2.

**To change the code of the projector:**

Press the Point ► or OK buttons to switch between Code 1 and Code 2.

**To change the code of the remote control:**

Press and hold both the MENU and IMAGE button on the remote control for more than 10 seconds to switch between Code 1 and Code 2.

After changing the code, make sure the remote control operates properly.

**✓ Note:**

- When the batteries of the remote control are replaced, the remote control code automatically returns to the initial code (Code 1).

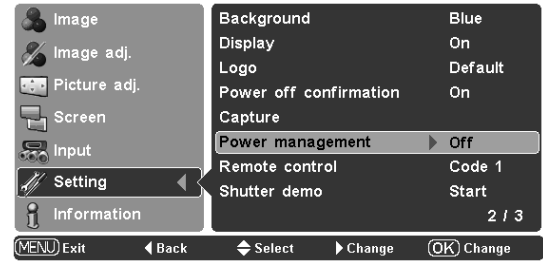
**Shutter demo**

Press the Point ► or OK buttons to start Shutter demo. The automatic slide shutter closes once with the lamp being turned on and opens up again. This is used for checking the operation of the automatic slide shutter.

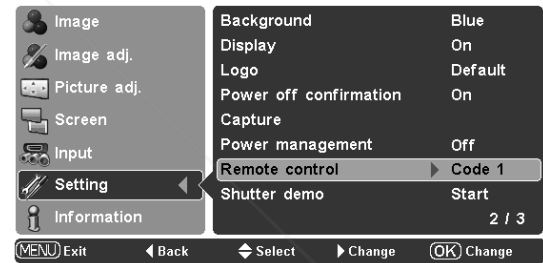

## Cleaning

This function is used to clean the inside of the projector. Using a blower as well is more effective. See page 44.

Press the Point ► or OK buttons, then the projected image is blacked out temporarily regardless of whether or not an input source is selected. The fans start to operate automatically to help blowing the dust.

To cancel the cleaning function, set the projector back into the right position, then press any other button during cleaning operations.

### ✓ Note:

- The Power management function cannot be operated during cleaning.

## Panel adjustment

This function is used to get the best picture reproduction of the R (red), G (green), and B (blue) LCD panels. If the proper adjustment is not made, you might get vertical noise lines on the screen.

This function should be made more than 10 minutes after turning on the projector with or without any signal. A dark environment helps make more accurate adjustment.

Press the OK button or Point ► button and the Test pattern screens will appear in the order of R (red), G (green), and B (blue). Use the Point ▲▼◀▶ buttons to adjust each pattern as follows:

1. Adjust the value in the Bright dialog box to minimize vertical lines in the bright part of the picture.
2. Adjust the value in the Dark dialog box to minimize vertical lines in the dark part of the picture.
3. Press the Point ▲▼ buttons to move on to the next color. Repeat step 1 and 2 for each R,G,B panel until the vertical lines of the picture are minimized.
4. Press the Point ▲▼ buttons to display the Check pattern screen and check the adjustment.
5. To close this screen and return to the menu, press the OK or MENU button.

## Highland

When using the projector in high altitudes (about 1,200 meters or more above the sea level), set this function "On." Press the Point ► or OK buttons to switch On/Off.

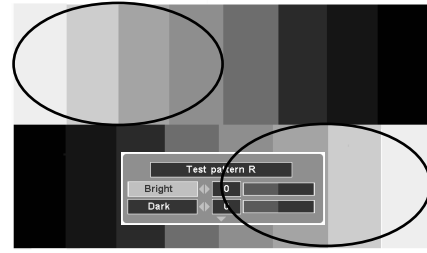
## Lamp counter reset

**Component** A system mode of the connected video signal is displayed from among 480i, 480p, 575i, 575p, 720p, and 1080i.

**HDMI** A system mode of the connected video signal is displayed from among D-VGA, D-480i, D-480p, D-575i, D-575p, D-720p, D-1080i, and D-1080p.

**PC** A resolution of the connected computer signal is displayed.

**No signal** When there is no signal input, “- - - -” is displayed.

**Out of recognition** When the connected input source is out of recognition, “Unknown” is displayed.

### H-sync freq.

The horizontal frequency of the input signal is displayed in KHz, or “- - - -” when no signal.

### V-sync freq.

The vertical frequency of the input signal is displayed in Hz, or “- - - -” when no signal.

### Lamp Time

The cumulative lamp operating time is displayed.

### Image

The selected image mode is displayed.

### Screen

The selected screen size is displayed.

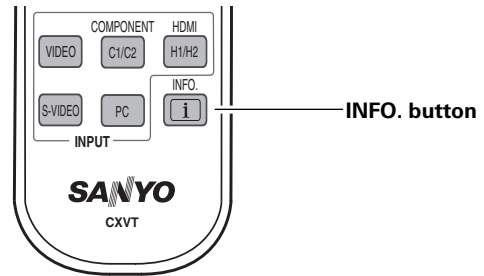

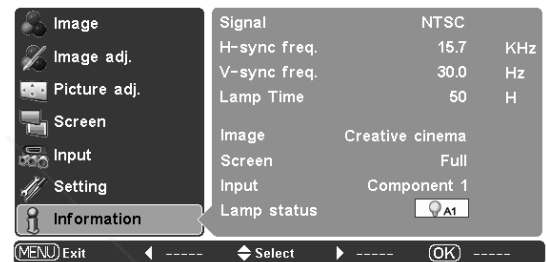

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# Maintenance and Cleaning

## Warning Indicator

The WARNING indicator shows the state of the function that protects the projector. Check the state of the WARNING indicator and the POWER indicator to take proper maintenance.

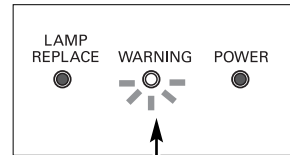
### **The projector is shut down and the WARNING indicator is blinking red.**

When the temperature inside the projector reaches a certain level, the projector is automatically shut down to protect its inside. The POWER indicator is blinking while the projector is being cooled down. When the projector has cooled down sufficiently (to its normal operating temperature), it can be turned on again by pressing the POWER ON/STAND-BY button.

✓ **Note:**

- The WARNING indicator continues to blink even after the temperature inside the projector returns to normal. When the projector is turned on again, the WARNING indicator stops blinking.

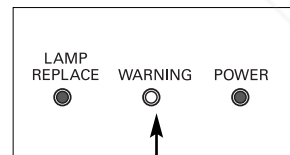
### Then check the items below.

- Did you provide appropriate space for the projector to be ventilated? Check the installing condition to see if ventilation slots are not blocked.
- Has the projector been installed near an Air-Conditioning/Heating Duct or Vent? Move the installation of the projector away from the duct or vent.
- Are the air filters clean? Clean the air filters periodically or replace it with a new one.

### **The projector is shut down and the WARNING indicator lights red.**

When the projector detects an abnormal condition, it is automatically shut down to protect the inside of the projector and the WARNING indicator lights red. In this case, unplug the AC power cord and plug it, and then turn on the projector once again to verify operation. If the projector cannot be turned on and the WARNING indicator lights red, unplug the AC power cord and contact the service station.

## Cleaning the RGB panels

Blemishes such as dust and dirt on the internal optical components of the projector tend to degrade the brightness of the screen and are likely to appear as a shadow on the screen, which can lead to deterioration of image quality.

This projector has the RGB panel cleaning holes on the underside for cleaning of the internal parts (such as optical components) of the projector. When you use the projector for a lengthy period of time or a shadow of dust appears on the projected screen, clean the inside of the projector.

Using the supplied air blower and with the Cleaning function in the Setting Menu (p.40), you can remove the dusts from the projector.

**✓ Note:**

- Dust might not be removed completely with these steps. Then contact the dealer where you purchased the projector or service center.

### CAUTION IN USING THE AIR BLOWER AND THE NOZZLE

- Turn the projector over when using the blower.
- Use only the supplied air blower and nozzle to keep the projector from being out of order or damaged. We could not guarantee the malfunction or breakage caused by other tools.
- Never use a commercially available compressed air duster. It causes the interior of the projector to malfunction with release of cold liquid propellant.
- Put the projector on a soft cloth to prevent scratching the surface.
- Open the hole cover only when you clean the inside of the projector.
- Do not look into the holes. A strong light could damage your eyes. (Do not look into the Air intake vent and Exhaust vent, too.)
- Use the blower and nozzle only to clean the projector. Do not attempt to use them for other purposes. Do not use the blower and nozzle against persons (particularly to eyes, mouth, or ears). Be especially careful to ensure that children do not put the blower and nozzle into their mouth and swallow them.
- Do not attempt to pull the nozzle out of the blower. If the nozzle happened to be pulled out, put it back into the blower immediately.
- Do not use the blower supplied with this projector (model: Z60) to clean the other models: Z4, Z3, and Z1X.

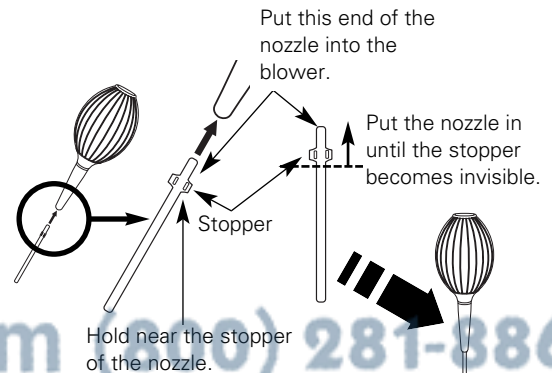
If something is wrong with the projector (such as smoke, a strange sound, or an abnormal odor) while you are cleaning, turn off and unplug the projector immediately, then call the dealer where you purchased the projector or service center.

### If the nozzle is pulled out ....

The nozzle has the stopper. Put the stopper-side of the nozzle into the blower. Put the nozzle firmly into the blower until the stopper becomes invisible.

When putting the nozzle into the blower, hold near the stopper so that it will not break.

Be sure not to try to pull the nozzle out of the blower.



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## Clean by using the Cleaning function in the Setting Menu

- 1 Turn the projector on and press the MENU button to display the On-Screen Menu. Select the Setting Menu with the Point ▲▼ buttons. Press the Point ► or OK buttons to access the submenu items.
- 2 Select Cleaning and then press the OK or Point ► buttons. The screen is blacked out temporarily.
- 3 Turn the projector over. Loosen the screw that secures the hole cover, and then open the hole cover.
- 4 Put the blower's nozzle into a hole.
- 5 Blow air into the projector with the blower watching the position of the dust from the screen.
- 6 When cleaning is done, pull the blower out of the hole and replace the hole cover and secure it with the screw.
- 7 Set the projector back into the right position, then press any button on the top control or on the remote control to quit the Cleaning function.

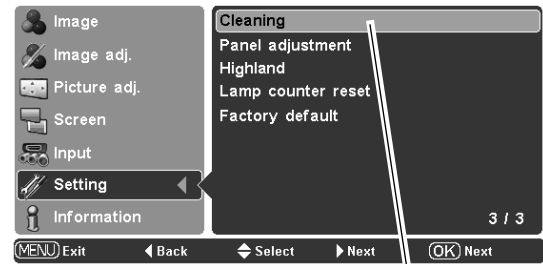
\* Do not open the hole cover except when you clean the inside of the projector to prevent foreign matters from getting into the projector. If it is open especially while operating the projector, the optical parts could damage.

### Which hole to put the nozzle in?

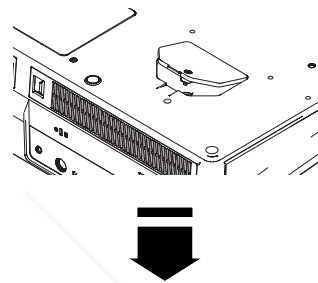
When you look at the screen:

- When red spots (dust) are particularly noticeable, put the nozzle into the R panel cleaning holes.
- When green spots (dust) are particularly noticeable, put the nozzle into the G panel cleaning holes.
- When blue spots (dust) are particularly noticeable, put the nozzle into the B panel cleaning holes.

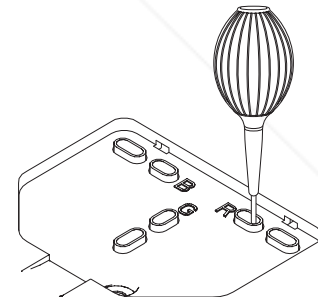

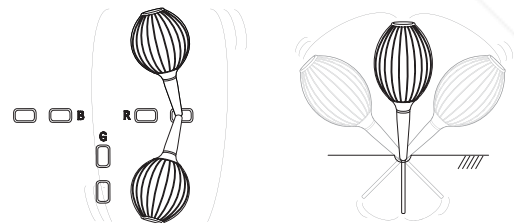

Wave the nozzle back and forth inside of the projector.

(Do not attempt to bend the nozzle.)



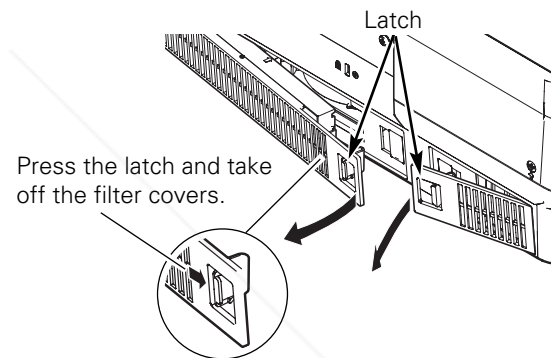
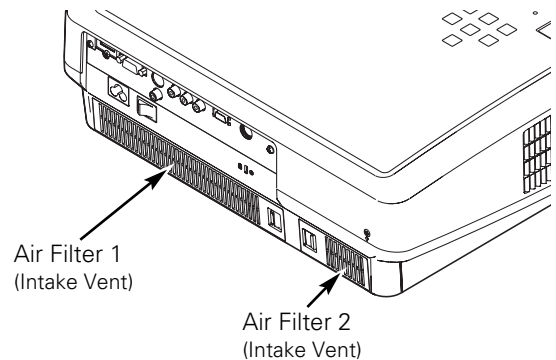
Use only the supplied blower and nozzle. Do not use a commercially available compressed air duster. It causes the interior of the projector to malfunction with release of cold liquid propellant. We could not guarantee the malfunction of breakage by using other tools.

## Cleaning the Air Filters

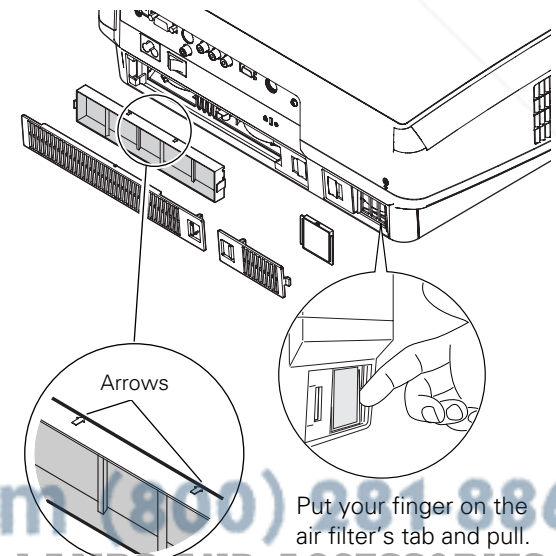
The air filters prevent dust from accumulating on the surface of the optical elements inside the projector. Should the air filters become clogged with dust particles, they will reduce cooling fan's effectiveness and may result in a buildup of internal heat and adversely affect the life of the projector. Clean the air filters by following the steps below.

### Cleaning the Air Filter 1 and 2

- 1** Press the latch and release it. Take off the filter covers. Do not try to pull the delicate filter part.
- 2** Pull out the air filters.  
When taking out the Air Filter 2, put your finger on the air filter's tab and pull.
- 3** Remove dust and dirt with a soft brush or a vacuum cleaner. Be careful not to damage the air filters and do not clean them with water.  
When the Air Filter 1 gets dusty and dirty, replace it with a new one. For ordering the replacement filter, contact your sales dealer.
- 4** Put the air filters back into the position and close the filter covers. Do not push the delicate filter part. Make sure that the air filters are properly and fully inserted.



Pull out the air filters.



When putting back this air filter, make sure that the arrows on the filter are facing towards the projector.

### **RECOMMENDATION**

**We recommend avoiding dusty/smoky environments when operating the projector. Usage in these environment may cause a poor image quality.**

When using the projector under dusty or smoky conditions, dust may accumulate on a lens, LCD panels, or optical elements inside the projector degrading the quality of a projected image.

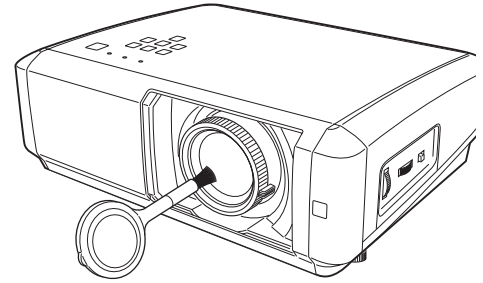
When the symptoms above are noticed, contact your authorized dealer or service station for proper cleaning.

### ***Cleaning the Projection Lens***

Unplug the AC power cord before cleaning.

Gently wipe the projection lens with a cleaning cloth that contains a small amount of non-abrasive camera lens cleaner, or use a lens cleaning paper or a commercially available air blower to clean the lens. Avoid using an excessive amount of cleaner. Abrasive cleaners, solvents, or other harsh chemicals might scratch the surface of the lens.

When the projector is not in use, make sure that the automatic slide shutter is closed.

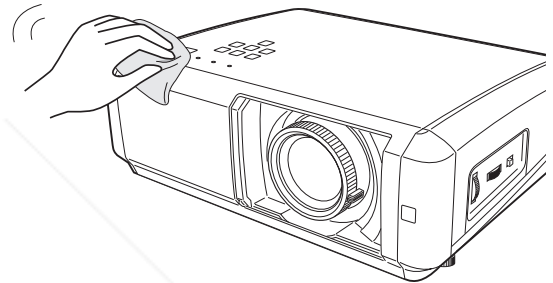


### ***Cleaning the Projector Cabinet***

Unplug the AC power cord before cleaning.

Gently wipe the projector body with a dry soft cloth. When the cabinet is heavily soiled, apply a small amount of mild detergent and finish with a dry soft cloth. Avoid using an excessive amount of cleaner. Abrasive cleaners, solvents, or other harsh chemicals might scratch the surface of the cabinet.

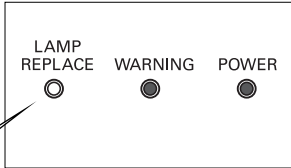
When the projector is not in use, put it in an appropriate carrying case to protect it from dust and scratches.



**Lamp Replacement**

When the projection lamp of this projector reaches its end of life, the LAMP REPLACE indicator emits yellow light. If this indicator lights yellow, replace the lamp with a new one promptly. The time when the LAMP REPLACE indicator should light is depending on the lamp mode.

**Top Control**



This indicator lights yellow when the projection lamp reaches its end of life.



**CAUTION**

Allow the projector to cool, for at least 45 minutes before you open the lamp cover. The inside of the projector can become very hot.

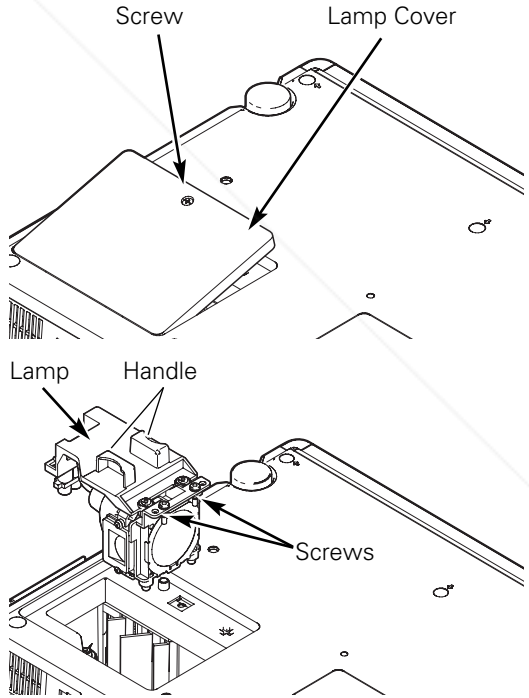


**CAUTION**

For continued safety, replace the lamp with the same type lamp. Do not drop the lamp or touch the glass bulb! The glass can shatter and may cause injury.

Follow these steps to replace the lamp.

- 1** Turn off the projector and unplug the AC power cord. Let the projector cool for at least 45 minutes.
- 2** Turn the projector over. Loosen the screw that secures the lamp cover, and then open the lamp cover.
- 3** Loosen the two (2) screws that secure the lamp. Lift the lamp out of the projector by using the built in handle.
- 4** Replace the lamp with a new one and secure it with the two (2) screws. Make sure that the lamp is set properly. Put the lamp cover back and secure it with the screw.
- 5** Connect the AC power cord to the projector and turn on the projector.
- 6** **Reset the Lamp replacement counter.**

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## Lamp Replacement Counter

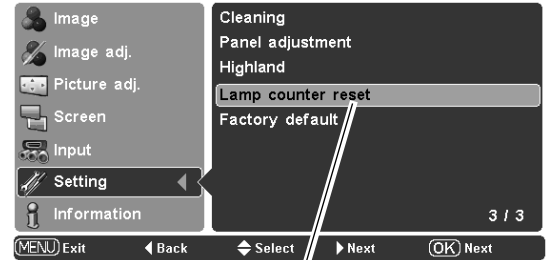
Be sure to reset the lamp replacement counter after the lamp is replaced. When the lamp replacement counter is reset, the LAMP REPLACE indicator stops lighting.

- 1 Turn the projector on and press the MENU button to display the On-Screen Menu. Select the Setting Menu with the Point ▲▼ buttons. Press the Point ► button to access the submenu items.
- 2 Select Lamp counter reset and then press the the OK or Point ► buttons. "Lamp replacement counter reset?" appears. Select [Yes] and then press the OK button.
- 3 Another confirmation dialog box appears, and select [Yes] to reset the Lamp replacement counter.

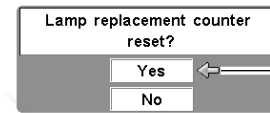
✓ **Note:**

- Do not reset the Lamp replacement counter without implementing lamp replacement. Be sure to reset the Lamp replacement counter only after replacing the lamp.

## LAMP HANDLING PRECAUTIONS

This projector uses a high-pressure lamp which must be handled carefully and properly. Improper handling may result in accidents, injury, or create a fire hazard.

- Lamp lifetime may differ from lamp to lamp and according to the environment of use. There is no guarantee of the same lifetime for each lamp. Some lamps may fail or terminate their lifetime in a shorter period of time than other similar lamps.
- If the projector indicates that the lamp should be replaced, i.e., if the LAMP REPLACE indicator lights up, replace the lamp with a new one IMMEDIATELY after the projector has cooled down. (Follow carefully the instructions in the Lamp Replacement section of this manual.) Continuous use of the lamp with the LAMP REPLACE indicator lighted may increase the risk of lamp explosion.
- A Lamp may explode as a result of vibration, shock or degradation as a result of hours of use as its lifetime draws to an end. Risk of explosion may differ according to the environment or conditions in which the projector and lamp are being used.

### IF A LAMP EXPLODES, THE FOLLOWING SAFETY PRECAUTIONS SHOULD BE TAKEN.

If a lamp explodes, disconnect the projector's AC plug from the AC outlet immediately. Contact an authorized service station for a checkup of the unit and replacement of the lamp. Additionally, check carefully to ensure that there are no broken shards or pieces of glass around the projector or coming out from the cooling air circulation holes. Any broken shards found should be cleaned up carefully. No one should check the inside of the projector except those who are authorized trained technicians and who are familiar with projector service. Inappropriate attempts to service the unit by anyone, especially those who are not appropriately trained to do so, may result in an accident or injury caused by pieces of broken glass.

# Appendix

## Troubleshooting

Before calling your dealer or service center for assistance, check the items below once again.

- Make sure you have properly connected the projector to peripheral equipment as described in “Connecting to Video Equipment” and “Connecting to a Computer” on pages 16 – 17.
- Make sure all equipment is connected to an AC outlet and the power is turned on.
- When you operate the projector with a computer and it does not project an image, restart the computer.

When it is half-open, the POWER indicator blinks orange and the projector cannot be turned on (see page 18).</li><li>– See if the Main On/Off switch is on.</li><li>– Wait 60 seconds after the projector is turned off to restart the projector. The projector can be turned on after the POWER indicator turns red (see page 19).</li><li>– Check the WARNING indicator. If the WARNING indicator lights red, the projector cannot be turned on (see page 42).</li><li>– Check the projection lamp (see page 47).</li><li>– Check if the projector is installed on a flat surface.</li></ul>
<b>Image is out of focus.</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>– Adjust the focus of the projector (see page 22).</li><li>– Provide proper distance between the projector and the projection screen (see page 13).</li><li>– Check the projection lens to see if it needs cleaning (see page 46).</li><li>– Moving the projector from a cool to warm place may result in moisture condensation on the projection lens. If this occurs, leave the projector off and wait until condensation evaporates.</li></ul>
<b>No image.</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>– Check the connection between your computer or video equipment and the projector (see pages 16 – 17).</li><li>– See if the input signal is correctly output from your computer. For some laptop computers, the setting for the monitor output needs to be changed when connecting to a projector. See your computer’s instruction manual for the setting.</li><li>– It takes about 20 seconds to display an image after turning on the projector.</li><li>– See if the selected system is corresponding to your computer or video equipment (see pages 24 – 26).</li><li>– Select a correct input source once again through Menu operation (see pages 25 – 26).</li><li>– Make sure the temperature is not out of the specified operating temperature (41°F – 95°F [5°C – 35°C]).</li></ul>
<b>Image is Left/Right reversed.</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>– Check the Mounting/Rear item (see page 37).</li></ul>
<b>Image is Top/Bottom reversed.</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>– Check the Mounting item (see page 37).</li></ul>
