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




Before operating this projector, read this manual thoroughly and operate the projector properly.

This projector provides many convenient features and functions. Operating the projector properly enables you to manage those features and maintain it in better condition for a considerable time.

Improper operation may result in not only shortening the product life, but also malfunctions, fire hazard, or other accidents.


If your projector seems to operate improperly, read this manual again, check operations and cable connections and try the solutions in the "Troubleshooting" section in the end of this booklet. If the problem still persists, contact the dealer where you purchased the projector or the service center.






WARNING : TO REDUCE THE RISK OF FIRE OR ELECTRIC SHOCK, DO NOT EXPOSE THIS APPLIANCE TO RAIN OR MOISTURE.

- This projector produces intense light from the projection lens. Do not stare directly into the lens as much as possible. Eye damage could result. Be especially careful that children do not stare directly into the beam.
- Install the projector in a proper position. If not, it may result in a fire hazard.
- Provide appropriate space on the top, sides and rear of the projector cabinet for allowing air circulation and cooling the projector. Minimum clearances must be maintained. If the projector is to be built into a compartment or similarly enclosed, the minimum distances must be maintained. Do not cover the ventilation slot on the projector. Heat build-up can reduce the service life of your projector, and can also be dangerous.



 If the projector is not to be used for an extended time, unplug the projector from the power outlet.

CAUTION ON HANGING FROM THE CEILING



When hanging the projector from the ceiling, clean the air intake vents, air filters, and top of the projector periodically with a vacuum cleaner. If you leave the projector without cleaning for a long time, the dust will block the operation of the cooling function, and it may cause a breakdown or a disaster.

DO NOT SET THE PROJECTOR IN GREASY, WET, OR SMOKY CONDITIONS SUCH AS IN A KITCHEN TO PREVENT A BREAKDOWN OR A DISASTER. IF THE PROJECTOR COMES IN CONTACT WITH OIL OR CHEMICALS, IT MAY BECOME DETERIORATED.

SAFETY INSTRUCTIONS

All the safety and operating instructions should be read before the product is operated.

Read all of the instructions given here and retain them for later use. Unplug this projector from AC power supply before cleaning. Do not use liquid or aerosol cleaners. Use a damp cloth for cleaning.

Follow all warnings and instructions marked on the projector.

For added protection to the projector during a lightning storm, or when it is left unattended and unused for long periods of time, unplug it from the wall outlet. This will prevent damage due to lightning and power line surges.

Do not expose this unit to rain or use near water... for example, in a wet basement, near a swimming pool, etc...

Do not use attachments not recommended by the manufacturer as they may cause hazards.

Do not place this projector on an unstable cart, stand, or table. The projector may fall, causing serious injury to a child or adult, and serious damage to the projector. Use only with a cart or stand recommended by the manufacturer, or sold with the projector. Wall or shelf mounting should follow the manufacturer's instructions, and should use a mounting kit approved by the manufacturers.

An appliance and cart combination should be moved with care. Quick stops, excessive force, and uneven surfaces may cause the appliance and cart combination to overturn.



Slots and openings in the back and bottom of the cabinet are provided for ventilation, to insure reliable operation of the equipment and to protect it from overheating.

This projector should not be placed in a built-in installation such as a book case unless proper ventilation is provided.

Upon completion of any service or repairs to this projector, ask the service technician to perform routine safety checks to determine that the projector is in safe operating condition.



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FEATURES AND DESIGN

This Multimedia Projector is designed with most advanced technology for portability, durability, and ease of use. This projector utilizes built-in multimedia features, a palette of 16.77 million colors, and matrix liquid crystal display (LCD) technology.

Compact Design

This projector is extremely compact in size and weight. It is designed to carry and work anywhere you wish to use.

Compatibility

This projector widely accepts various video and computer input signals including;

Computers

IBM-compatible or Macintosh computer up to 1600 x 1200 resolution.

6 Color Systems

NTSC, PAL, SECAM, NTSC 4.43, PAL-M or PAL-N color system can be connected.

Component Video

Component video signal, such as a DVD player output high definition TV signals including 480i, 480p, 575i, 575p, 720p, 1035i or 1080i, can be connected.

S-Video

S-Video signal, such as a S-VHS VCR output signal, can be connected.

High Resolution Image

This projector provides 1366 x 768 dots resolution for computer input and 800 horizontal TV lines. Resolution from a computer between XGA (1024 x 768) and UXGA (1600 x 1200) is compressed into 1024 x 768 dots. This projector cannot display image of over 1600 x 1200 dots. When resolution of your computer is over than 1600 x 1200, reset a computer output for lower resolution.

Multi-Scan System

This projector has Multi-Scan System to conform to almost all computer output signals quickly. There is no need for troublesome manual adjustment of frequency and other settings.

One-Touch Auto PC Adjustment

Incoming computer video signals are recognized and best adjustment is automatically set by Auto PC Adjustment. No complicated setup is necessary and projection is always precise.

Motor-driven Lens Shift

Projection lens can be moved up and down with motordriven lens shift function. This function makes it easy to provide projected image where you want. Zoom and focus can be also adjusted with motor-driven

Digital Zoom function adjusts image size to approx. $1/4 \sim 49$ times of original image size, allowing you to focus on crucial information at a presentation.

Keystone Correction

Positioning of a projector may result in distorted image being displayed in a trapezoid shape. Keystone Correction solves this problem by digitally altering projection to produce undistorted images.

Power Management

Power Management function is provided to reduce power consumption while a projector is not in use.

This Power Management function operates to turn Projection Lamp off when a projector detects signal interruption and any button is not pressed. Projection Lamp is automatically turned on again when a projector detects signal or any operation button is pressed. This projector is shipped with this function ON.

Digital Visual Interface

This projector is equipped with DVI 24-pin terminal for connecting DVI output from a computer.

Color management

You can make fine adjustments to the colors on the screen to change them to the desired colors.

At this time, the colors are changed within an extremely narrow hue range, so that other colors are not affected. The luminance and gamma values can also be changed in addition to the hue.

This allows colors to be reproduced with great accuracy. Faithful color reproduction and color correction which effectively matches colors to scenes or emphasizes colors can be achieved.

Adjustments can be made easily, because they are reflected in the on-screen images in real time. Up to eight colors can be adjusted at a single time. The adjustment data can be saved for images in both in video mode and PC mode (total 20 images). The adjusted data is displayed in a list for easy checking.

Auto Picture Control

The gamma value can be adjusted automatically in accordance with the luminance of the screen. Images that are either too dark or too bright can be adjusted to the optimum level, so that these images can be reproduced without any distortion.



CONNECTING AC POWER CORD


This projector uses nominal input voltages of 100-120 V or 200-240 V AC. This projector automatically selects correct input voltage. It is designed to work with single-phase power systems having a grounded neutral conductor. To reduce risk of electrical shock, do not plug into any other type of power system.

Consult your authorized dealer or service station if you are not sure of type of power supply being in use.

Connect a projector with a peripheral equipment before turning a projector on. (Refer to pages $12 \sim 14$ for connection.)

For safety, unplug AC Power Cord when an appliance is not used.

When this projector is connected to outlet with AC Power Cord, an appliance is in Stand-by Mode and consumes a little electric power.



Connect AC Power Cord (supplied) to a projector. AC outlet must be near this equipment and must be easily accessible.

CAUTION

The AC Power Cord must meet the requirement of the country where you use the projector. Confirm the AC plug type with the chart below. The proper AC Power Cord must be used. If the supplied AC Power Cord does not match the AC outlet, contact your sales dealer.


LENS INSTALLATION

Before setting up a projector, install Projection Lens on Projector.

When installing the lens, remove the cover cap in the projector.




POSITIONING PROJECTOR

This projector is designed to project on a flat projection surface.


ROOM LIGHT

Brightness in a room has a great influence on picture quality. It is recommended to limit ambient lighting in order to provide best image.



LENS SHIFT ADJUSTMENT

Projection lens can be moved up and down with motor-driven lens shift function. This function makes it easy to provide projected image where you want. Refer to P18 for operation.




ADJUSTABLE FEET

Picture tilt and projection angle can be adjusted by rotating ADJUSTABLE FEET. Projection angle can be adjusted to 10.5 degrees.

- *I* Lift front of a projector and pull FEET LOCK LATCHES on both sides of a projector.
- 2 Release FEET LOCK LATCHES to lock ADJUSTABLE FEET and rotate ADJUSTABLE FEET to fine tune position and tilt.
- **3** To shorten ADJUSTABLE FEET, lift front of a projector and pull and undo FEET LOCK LATCHES.

Position and keystone distortion of image can be adjusted using Menu Operation. (Refer to P 22 and 38.)




INSTALLING PROJECTOR IN PROPER POSITION


TURNING ON THE PROJECTOR

- *Complete peripheral connections (with a computer, VCR, etc.) before turning on the projector.*
- 2 Connect the projector's AC power cord into an AC outlet. The LAMP Indicator lights RED, and READY Indicator lights GREEN.
- 3 Press the POWER ON-OFF button on the top control or on the remote control to ON. The LAMP Indicator dims, and the cooling fans start to operate. The preparation display appears on the screen and the count down starts.



The preparation display disappears after 20 ~ 30 seconds.

Selected Input Source and Lamp control



4 After the count-down, the input source that was selected last and the Lamp control status icon (see page 40) appear on the screen.

If the projector is locked with a PIN code, PIN code Input Dialog Box will appear. Enter the PIN code as instructed below.

Enter a PIN code

Select a number by pressing the POINT LEFT/RIGHT button and fix the number with the SELECT button. The number will change to "*". If you fixed a wrong number, move the pointer to "Set" or "Clear" once by pressing the POINT DOWN button, then return to "PIN code". Enter the correct number again.

Repeat this step to complete entering a four-digit number.

When the four-digit number is fixed, the pointer will automatically move to "Set". Press the SELECT button so that you can start to operate the projector.

If you entered a wrong PIN code, "PIN code" and the number (*****) will turn red and disappear. Enter a correct PIN code all over again.

What is PIN code?

PIN code is a security code using Personal Identification Number that allows the person who knows it to operate the projector. Setting PIN code prevents others except the specific users from operating the projector.

A PIN code consists of a four-digit number. Refer to PIN Code Lock function in Setting on page 42 for locking operation of the projector with your PIN code.



TURNING OFF THE PROJECTOR

- Press the POWER ON-OFF button on the top control or on the remote control, and a message "Power off?" appears on the screen.
- 2 Press the POWER ON-OFF button again to turn off the projector. The LAMP Indicator lights bright and READY Indicator turns off. After projector is turned off, Cooling Fans operate (for 90 seconds). During this "Cooling Down" period, this appliance cannot be turned on.
- 3 When the projector has cooled down, READY Indicator lights GREEN again and you can turn projector on. After cooling down completely, disconnect AC Power Cord.



The message disappears after 4 seconds.



TO MAINTAIN THE LIFE OF LAMP, ONCE YOU TURN PROJECTOR ON, WAIT AT LEAST 5 MINUTES BEFORE TURNING IT OFF. DO NOT DISCONNECT AC POWER CORD WHILE

COOLING FANS ARE RUNNING OR BEFORE READY INDICATOR LIGHTS GREEN AGAIN. OTHERWISE IT WILL RESULT IN SHORTENING LAMP LIFE.

NOTE;

- The projector cannot be turned on during the cooling period with the READY indicator turned off. You can turn it on again after the READY indicator GREEN again.
- When the On start function is on, this projector is turned on automatically by connecting the AC power cord to an AC outlet. (See page 40 for the On start function.)
- Do not operate the projector continuously without rest. Continuous use may result in shortening the lamp life. Turn off the projector and give it a rest about an hour in every 24 hours.
- This projector monitors internal temperature and automatically controls the running speed of the cooling fans.
- If the WARNING TEMP indicator flashes red, see "WARNING TEMP INDICATOR " on page 44.

ZOOM ADJUSTMENT

- Press ZOOM button on Top Control or ZOOM ▲/▼ button on 1 Remote Control Unit. Message "Zoom" is displayed.
- Press ZOOM ▲ button or POINT UP button to make image 2 larger, and press ZOOM ▼ button or POINT DOWN button to make image smaller.

Message disappears after 4 seconds.

FOCUS ADJUSTMENT

- Press FOCUS button on Top Control or FOCUS ▲/▼ button on 1 Remote Control Unit. Message "Focus" is displayed.

After capturing the projected image, go to the Logo function and set it to "User". Then the captured image can be displayed when turning on the projector next time.

To capture the image, select [Yes]. To cancel the Capture function, select [No].

NOTE;

- Before capturing an image, select Standard in the Image Select Menu to capture a proper image. (See page 29, 33.)
- A signal from a computer can be captured up to XGA (1024 X 768).
- Certain signals may not be captured properly.
- When capturing the image that has been adjusted by the Keystone function, the adjustment data is automatically reset and the projector captures an image without keystone correction.
- When starting to capture a new image, the previously stored image is cleared even if you cancel the capturing.
- Once you exit the Logo menu after setting Logo lock to "On", you are required to enter the PIN code every attempting to change the Logo setting.

Logo PIN Code Lock

This function prevents an unauthorized person from changing the Logo setting.

- Off the Logo setting can be changed freely from the Logo menu.
- On the Logo setting cannot be changed without the Logo PIN code.

If you want to change the Logo PIN Code Lock setting, enter a Logo PIN code along the following steps. The initial Logo PIN code is set "4321" at the factory.





Power management

For reducing power consumption as well as maintaining the lamp life, the Power Management function turns off the projection lamp when the input signal is interrupted and no button is pressed for 30 seconds or more.

If the input signal is interrupted and no button is pressed for 30 seconds or more, the timer display with the message "No signal" appears on the screen. The count-down of the set time will get started. The count-down time can be set between 1 and 30 minutes.

When the count-down time has been elapsed, the lamp will be turned off to cool itself down. The READY indicator will be switched off during this cooling-off period. The next operation depends on the setting as follows :

Ready When the lamp has been fully cooled down, the READY indicator starts flashing. In this condition, the projection lamp will be turned on if the input signal is reconnected or any button on the top control or remote control unit is pressed.

Shutdown . . .When the lamp has been fully cooled down, the power will be turned off.

OffThe Power Management function is canceled.

When this function is "On," the projector is automatically turned on just by connecting the AC power cord to a wall outlet.





Remote control

This projector provides eight different remote control codes (Code 1-Code 8); the factory-set, initial code (Code 1) and the other seven codes (Code 2 to Code 8). This switching function prevents remote control interference when operating several projectors or video equipment at the same time.

For example operating the projector in "Code 7", both the projector and the remote control must be switched to "Code 7".







Offthe projector is not locked with the PIN code.






MAINTENANCE

WARNING TEMP. INDICATOR

The Warning Temp. Indicator flashes red to let you know the internal temperature of the projector exceeds the normal level. If the temperature goes up further, the projector will be turned off automatically and the Ready indicator will go out. (The Warning Temp. Indicator continues flashing.) After the cooling-off period, the Ready Indicator lights on again and the projector can be turned on by pressing the On/Off button on the remote control unit or on the top control. When you turn on the projector, the Warning Temp. Indicator will go out.

If the Warning Temp. Indicator is still flashing, check the followings;

- *I* Ventilation Slots of a projector may be blocked. In such an event, reposition a projector so that Ventilation Slots are not obstructed.
- 2 Air Filter may be clogged with dust particles. Clean Air Filter by following section AIR FILTER CARE AND CLEANING on next page.
- **3** If WARNING TEMP. Indicator remains on after performing above checks, Cooling Fans or Internal Circuits may be malfunctioning. Contact the service station.



When both of the Warning Temp. and Ready indicators are flashing:

When the projector detects an internal problem, it will shut down automatically and both of the Warning temp. and Ready Indicators start flashing. In this condition, the projector cannot be turned on even if you press the On/Off button on the remote control unit or on the top control. If this case happenes, disconnect and reconnect the AC power cord, and then turn on the projector again to check its operation. If the projector shuts down again or fails to be turned on, the internal check and repair will be required. Plug off the AC power cord and contact service station.



AIR FILTER CARE AND CLEANING

Air filters help prevent dust from accumulating on the optical elements inside the projector. To whatever extent the air filters become clogged with dust particles, the cooling fans' effectiveness is reduced, which may result in an internal heat build-up and adversely affect the life of the projector. Therefore, for appropriate care and use of the projector, regular cleaning of the air filters is necessary.

How often the air filters should be cleaned really depends upon the environment in which the projector is being operated. As a rough guide, under a normally clean operating environment, the air filters should be cleaned apporoximately every 200 hours of use. However, if the projector is being operated in a somewhat dusty or smoky environment, the air filters should be cleaned more often; for consistently good projector operation and performance, timely cleaning of the air filters is a very important factor. When appropriate, clean the air filters following the steps below.


- *I* Turn off a projector, and disconnect AC power cord from an AC outlet.
- 2 Turn over projector and remove the air filters by pulling the latches upward.
- 3 Clean the air filters with a brush or rinse them softly. When rinsing the air filters, dry them well.
- **4** Replace the air filters properly. Make sure that the air filters are fully inserted to the projector.

CAUTION

Do not operate the projector with the Air Filter(s) removed. Dust may accumulate on the LCD Panels and Projection Mirrors degrading the picture quality.

Do not put anything into the air intake vents. Doing so may result in a malfunction of the projector.

Failure to properly clean the projector's air filters (in accordance with the instructions in your Projector's Operating Manual, or more frequently in any environment which is somewhat dusty or smoky) could result in overheating and will void the warranty on the projector.



NOTE: If the dust cannot be removed by cleaning, it is probably time to replace the air filters with new ones. Please consult your dealer.

RECOMMENDATION

We recommend avoiding dusty/smoky environments when operating the projector. Usage in these environments may cause a poor image quality.

When using the projector under dusty or smoky conditions, dust may accumulate on a lens, liquid crystal panels, or optical elements inside the projector. Such condition may degrade the quality of the projected image. When the symptoms above are noticed, contact your authorized dealer or service station for proper cleaning.

CLEANING PROJECTION LENS

Follow these steps to clean the projection lens:

Turn off the projector, and unplug the AC power cord from an AC outlet.

Gently wipe the cleaning cloth over the projection lens.

2 Apply a non-abrasive camera lens cleaner to a dry soft cleaning cloth. Avoid using an excessive amount of cleaner. Abrasive cleaners, solvents or other harsh chemicals might scratch the surface of the lens.

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

TOP CONTROL





Allow a projector to cool, for at least 45 minutes before you open Lamp Cover. The inside of a projector can become very hot.

For continued safety, replace with a lamp assembly of the same type.

Do not drop a lamp assembly or touch a glass bulb! The glass can shatter and may cause injury.

Follow these steps to replace lamp assembly.

- *I* Turn off a projector and disconnect AC plug. Allow a projector to cool for at least 45 minutes.
- 2 Loosen 2 screws with a screwdriver and open Lamp Cover.
- **3** Loosen 2 screws with a screwdriver and pull out Lamp Assembly by grasping Handle.
- 4 Replace Lamp Assembly with a new one and tighten 2 screws back. Make sure that Lamp Assembly is set properly. Replace Lamp Cover and tighten 2 screws.
- 5 Connect AC Power Cord to a projector and turn it on.
- 6 Reset Lamp Replace Counter (refer to next page "LAMP REPLACE COUNTER" section).
- **NOTE :** Do not reset Lamp Replace Counter when Projection Lamp is not replaced.







LAMP HANDLING PRECAUTIONS

This projector uses a high-pressure lamp which must be handled carefully and properly. Improper handling may result in accidents, injury, or create a fire hazard.

- Lamp lifetime may differ from lamp to lamp and according to the environment of use. There is no guarantee of the same lifetime for each lamp. Some lamps may fail or terminate their lifetime in a shorter period of time than other similar lamps.
- If the projector indicates that the lamp should be replaced, i.e., if the LAMP REPLACE INDICATOR lights up, replace the lamp with a new one IMMEDIATELY after the projector has cooled down.
 (Follow carefully the instructions in the LAMP REPLACEMENT section of this manual.) Continuous use of the lamp with the LAMP REPLACE INDICATOR lighted may increase the risk of lamp explosion.
- A Lamp may explode as a result of vibration, shock or degradation as a result of hours of use as its lifetime draws to an end. Risk of explosion may differ according to the environment or conditions in which the projector and lamp are being used.

FIX FOR LAMPEXALODES, THE FOLLOWING SAFETY PRECAUTIONS SHOULD BE TAKEN.

If a lamp explodes, disconnect the projector's AC plug from the AC outlet immediately. Contact an authorized service station for a checkup of the unit and replacement of the lamp. Additionally, check carefully to ensure that there are no broken shards or pieces of glass around the projector or coming out from the cooling air circulation holes. Any broken shards found should be cleaned up carefully. No one should check the inside of the projector except those who are authorized trained technicians and who are familiar with projector service. Inappropriate attempts to service the unit by anyone, especially those who are not appropriately trained to do so, may result in an accident or injury caused by pieces of broken glass.

TROUBLESHOOTING

Before calling your dealer or service center for assistance, check matters below once again.

1. Make sure you have connected a projector to your computer or video equipment as described in section "CONNECTING PROJECTOR" on pages 12 ~ 14.

- 2. Check cable connection. Verify that all computer, video and power cord are properly connected.
- 3. Verify that all power is switched on.
- 4. If a projector still does not produce an image, re-start your computer.
- 5. If an image still does not appear, unplug a projector from your computer and check your computer monitor's display. Problem may be with your graphics controller rather than with a projector. (When you reconnect a projector, be sure to turn computer and monitor off before you power up a projector. Power equipment back on in order of : Projector and computer.)
- 6. If problem still exists, check following chart.
